51 Recovery of costs incurred in emergency

- (1) This section applies to direct and indirect costs incurred by the board in performing the function specified in **section 44(c)**. 10
- (2) The costs are payable to the board by the mine operator of the mining operation where the emergency occurs and, if the mine operator fails to pay the costs, the board may recover the costs as a debt due in a court of competent jurisdiction.
- (3) **Sections 46 to 50** do not apply to the costs.

Miscellaneous provisions

52 Appointment of commissioner

- (1) The Governor-General may, by Order in Council made on the recommendation of the Minister,—
 - (a) appoint a commissioner to perform the functions specified in **section 44**:
 - (b) revoke the commissioner's appointment.

- (1) Until the appointed day, the Trust Board and any other person has, and may perform or exercise, the functions, responsibilities, duties, and powers conferred by the Mines Rescue Trust Act 1992 and the provisions of that Act are deemed to continue in force to the extent necessary for the performance or exercise of those functions, responsibilities, duties, and powers.
- (2) On and from the appointed day, neither the Trust Board nor any other person has any functions, responsibilities, duties, or powers under the Mines Rescue Trust Act 1992.

Money payable under Mines Rescue Trust Act 1992

- (1AA) Despite the repeal of the Mines Rescue Trust Act 1992 by **section 56**, sections 7, 8, and 9 of that Act are to be treated as continuing in force until the appointed day.
- (1) Any amount of money that immediately before the appointed 25 day was payable to the Trust Board under section 7 of the Mines Rescue Trust Act 1992 is, on and after the appointed day, payable to the board as if it were a levy payable under regulations made under **section 44**.
- (2) Despite the repeal of the Mines Rescue Trust Act 1992, the 30 Trust Board must, within three months of the appointed day, give the chief executive independently audited accounts of the Trust Board's income and expenditure under section 7 of the Mines Rescue Trust Act 1992 for the period beginning on the

occurrence of 1 April immediately preceding the repeal of that Act and ending at the close of the day before the appointed day.
