Pursuant to section 4(3) of the Tokelau Act 1948 (as amended by section 2 of the Tokelau Amendment Act 1978), His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, hereby makes the following regulations.

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Note

Changes authorised by section 17C of the Acts and Regulations Publication Act 1989 have been made in this reprint.

A general outline of these changes is set out in the notes at the end of this reprint, together with other explanatory material about this reprint.

These regulations are administered by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade.

Regulations

1 Title

These regulations may be cited as the Tokelau Coinage Regulations 1978.

2 Tokelau Commemorative Dollar

- (1) Subject to these regulations, there shall be made and issued pursuant to the Decimal Currency Act 1964 a coin, to be known as the Tokelau Commemorative Dollar, which shall be a legal tender only in Tokelau.
- (2) The design for the coin shall be as follows:
 - (a) for the obverse impression the effigy of Her Majesty the Queen in profile wearing a diamond tiara of festoons, scrolls, and collet-spikes, with the words "TOKELAU 1978" appearing between the border pattern and the top of the effigy. A border pattern around the periphery of the coin shall consist of 18 groups of 3 dots (each group representing the 3 atolls of Tokelau):
 - (b) for the reverse impression a fruit and part of the bole of a pandanus tree with the expression "\$1" to the left of the tree and the words "TAHI TALA" within the periphery of the bottom-left of the coin:
 - (c) the words "TOKELAU'S FIRST COIN" shall be incised in an otherwise plain edge.
- (3) The cost of making and issuing the coin, including freight, insurance, the cost of manufacture, and all incidental expenses, shall be paid out of the Tokelau Administration Account established under regulation 3 of the Tokelau Finance Regulations 1967 (SR 1967/40) (as amended by section 3(8) of the Tokelau Amendment Act 1976).
- (4) Except as provided in these regulations, all the provisions of the Coinage Regulations 1967 (SR 1967/104) relating to the one-dollar coin shall apply to the Tokelau Commemorative Dollar.

Explanatory note

This note is not part of the regulations, but is intended to indicate their general effect.

These regulations prescribe the design for the Tokelau Commemorative Dollar, which is to be made and issued as a legal tender only in Tokelau. Provisions relating to the standard composition, diameter, and weight of coinage are contained in the Decimal Currency Act 1964 and the Coinage Regulations 1967, both of which are in force in Tokelau.

Regulations

1 Title

These regulations may be cited as the Tokelau Coinage Regulations 1978, Amendment No 1, and shall be read together with and deemed part of the Tokelau Coinage Regulations 1978 (SR 1978/323) (hereinafter referred to as “the principal regulations”).

2 Tokelau 1979 Commemorative Dollar

- (1) Notwithstanding regulation 2(1) and (2) of the principal regulations, there shall be made and issued pursuant to the Decimal Currency Act 1964 a coin, to be known as the Tokelau 1979 Commemorative Dollar, which shall be a legal tender only in Tokelau.
- (2) The design for the coin shall be as follows:

- (a) for the obverse impression the effigy of Her Majesty the Queen in profile wearing a diamond tiara of festoons, scrolls, and collet-spikes, with the words “TOKELAU 1979” appearing between the border pattern and the top of the effigy. A border pattern around the periphery of the coin shall consist of 18 groups of 3 dots (each group representing the 3 atolls of Tokelau):
 - (b) for the reverse impression a tuluma (a wooden container having a lid and carrying handle) and a fish hook leaning against it, with the expression “\$1” to the left of the tuluma and the words “TAHI TALA” within the periphery of the bottom of the coin:
 - (c) the coin issued in a standard composition of silver and copper shall have a plain edge:
 - (d) the coin issued in a standard composition of copper and nickel shall have graining on the edge.
- (3) Except as provided in these regulations, all the provisions of the principal regulations relating to the Tokelau Commemorative Dollar (issued in 1978) shall apply to the Tokelau 1979 Commemorative Dollar.

1 Title

These regulations may be cited as the Tokelau Coinage Regulations 1978, Amendment No 2, and shall be read together with and deemed part of the Tokelau Coinage Regulations 1978 (SR 1978/323) (hereinafter referred to as “the principal regulations”).

2 Tokelau 1980 Souvenir Dollar

- (1) Notwithstanding regulation 2(1) and (2) of the principal regulations, there shall be made and issued pursuant to the Decimal Currency Act 1964 a coin, to be known as the Tokelau 1980 Souvenir Dollar, which shall be a legal tender only in Tokelau.
- (2) The design for the coin shall be as follows:
 - (a) for the obverse impression the effigy of Her Majesty the Queen in profile wearing a diamond tiara of festoons,

scrolls, and collet-spikes, with the words “TOKELAU 1980” appearing between the border pattern and the top of the effigy. A border pattern around the periphery of the coin shall consist of 18 groups of 3 dots (each group representing the 3 atolls of Tokelau):

- (b) for the reverse impression an ugauga (a robber or coconut crab (*birgus latro*)) with the expression “\$1” above the ugauga and the words “TAHI TALA” within the periphery of the bottom of the coin:
 - (c) the coin shall have graining on the edge.
- (3) Except as provided in these regulations, all the provisions of the principal regulations relating to the Tokelau Commemorative Dollar (issued in 1978) shall apply to the Tokelau 1980 Souvenir Dollar.

Regulations

1 Title

These regulations may be cited as the Tokelau Coinage Regulations 1978, Amendment No 3, and shall be read together with and deemed part of the Tokelau Coinage Regulations 1978 (SR 1978/323) (hereinafter referred to as “the principal regulations”).

2 Tokelau 1981 Souvenir Dollar

- (1) Notwithstanding regulation 2(1) and (2) of the principal regulations, there shall be made and issued pursuant to the Decimal Currency Act 1964 a coin, to be known as the Tokelau 1981 Souvenir Dollar, which shall be a legal tender only in Tokelau.
- (2) The design for the coin shall be as follows:
 - (a) for the obverse impression the effigy of Her Majesty the Queen in profile wearing a diamond tiara of festoons,

scrolls, and collet-spikes, with the words “TOKELAU 1981” appearing between the border pattern and the top of the effigy. A border pattern around the periphery of the coin shall consist of 18 groups of 3 dots (each group representing the 3 atolls of Tokelau):

- (b) for the reverse impression a frigate bird (*fregatus aquilas*) diving towards the sea, with the expression “\$1” to the left of the bird and the words “TAHI TALA” within the periphery of the bottom of the coin:
 - (c) the coin shall have graining on the edge.
- (3) Except as provided in these regulations, all the provisions of the principal regulations relating to the Tokelau Commemorative Dollar (issued in 1978) shall apply to the Tokelau 1981 Souvenir Dollar.

1 Title

These regulations may be cited as the Tokelau Coinage Regulations 1978, Amendment No 4, and shall be read together with and deemed part of the Tokelau Coinage Regulations 1978 (SR 1978/323) (hereinafter referred to as “the principal regulations”).

2 Tokelau 1982 Souvenir Dollar

- (1) Notwithstanding regulation 2(1) and (2) of the principal regulations, there shall be made and issued pursuant to the Decimal Currency Act 1964 a coin, to be known as the Tokelau 1982 Souvenir Dollar, which shall be a legal tender only in Tokelau.
- (2) The design for the coin shall be as follows:
 - (a) for the obverse impression, the effigy of Her Majesty the Queen in profile wearing a diamond tiara of festoons,

scrolls, and collet-spikes, with the words "TOKELAU 1982" appearing between the border pattern and the top of the effigy. A border pattern around the periphery of the coin shall consist of 18 groups of 3 dots (each group representing the 3 atolls of Tokelau):

- (b) for the reverse impression, 2 Tokelauan fishermen in a traditional canoe, one in the foreground landing a fish and the other at the rear of the canoe with a paddle, with 2 atolls in the background, a cloud to the right of the rear fisherman, the expression "\$1" to the left of the foremost fisherman, and the words "TAHI TALA" within the periphery of the top of the coin.
- (3) The coin shall have graining on the edge.
- (4) Except as provided in these regulations, all the provisions of the Coinage Regulations 1967 (SR 1967/104) relating to the one-dollar coin shall apply to the Tokelau 1982 Souvenir Dollar.

Regulations

1 Title

These regulations may be cited as the Tokelau Coinage Regulations 1978, Amendment No 5, and shall be read together with and deemed part of the Tokelau Coinage Regulations 1978 (SR 1978/323) (hereinafter referred to as “the principal regulations”).

2 Tokelau 1983 Souvenir Dollar

- (1) Notwithstanding regulation 2(1) and (2) of the principal regulations, there shall be made and issued pursuant to the Decimal Currency Act 1964 a coin, to be known as the Tokelau 1983 Souvenir Dollar, which shall be a legal tender only in Tokelau.
- (2) The design for the coin shall be as follows:
 - (a) for the obverse impression, the effigy of Her Majesty the Queen in profile wearing a diamond tiara of festoons,

scrolls, and collet-spikes, with the words “TOKELAU 1983” appearing between the border pattern and the top of the effigy. A border pattern around the periphery of the coin shall consist of 18 groups of 3 dots (each group representing the 3 atolls of Tokelau):

- (b) for the reverse impression, the bole of a coconut tree used as a rainwater collector with the effigies of a Tokelauan man in the foreground to the right of the tree drinking from a half coconut and a Tokelauan woman to the left of the tree bathing with the use of the rainwater poured from a half coconut, the expression “\$1” above the effigy of the man, and the words “TAHI TALA” within the periphery of the bottom of the coin.
- (3) The coin shall have graining on the edge.
 - (4) Except as provided in these regulations, all the provisions of the Coinage Regulations 1967 (SR 1967/104) relating to the one-dollar coin shall apply to the Tokelau 1983 Souvenir Dollar.

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Notes**1 General**

This is a reprint of the Tokelau Coinage Regulations 1978. The reprint incorporates all the amendments to the regulations as at 22 December 1978, as specified in the list of amendments at the end of these notes.

Relevant provisions of any amending enactments that contain transitional, savings, or application provisions that cannot be compiled in the reprint are also included, after the principal enactment, in chronological order. For more information, see <http://www.pco.parliament.govt.nz/reprints/>.

2 Status of reprints

Under section 16D of the Acts and Regulations Publication Act 1989, reprints are presumed to correctly state, as at the date of the reprint, the law enacted by the principal enactment and by the amendments to that enactment. This presumption applies even though editorial changes authorised by section 17C of the Acts and Regulations Publication Act 1989 have been made in the reprint.

This presumption may be rebutted by producing the official volumes of statutes or statutory regulations in which the principal enactment and its amendments are contained.

3 How reprints are prepared

A number of editorial conventions are followed in the preparation of reprints. For example, the enacting words are not included in Acts, and provisions that are repealed or revoked

4 *Changes made under section 17C of the Acts and Regulations Publication Act 1989*

Section 17C of the Acts and Regulations Publication Act 1989 authorises the making of editorial changes in a reprint as set out in sections 17D and 17E of that Act so that, to the extent permitted, the format and style of the reprinted enactment is consistent with current legislative drafting practice. Changes that would alter the effect of the legislation are not permitted. A new format of legislation was introduced on 1 January 2000. Changes to legislative drafting style have also been made since 1997, and are ongoing. To the extent permitted by section 17C of the Acts and Regulations Publication Act 1989, all legislation reprinted after 1 January 2000 is in the new format for legislation and reflects current drafting practice at the time of the reprint.

In outline, the editorial changes made in reprints under the authority of section 17C of the Acts and Regulations Publication Act 1989 are set out below, and they have been applied, where relevant, in the preparation of this reprint:

- omission of unnecessary referential words (such as “of this section” and “of this Act”)
- typeface and type size (Times Roman, generally in 11.5 point)
- layout of provisions, including:
 - indentation
 - position of section headings (eg, the number and heading now appear above the section)
- format of definitions (eg, the defined term now appears in bold type, without quotation marks)
- format of dates (eg, a date formerly expressed as “the 1st day of January 1999” is now expressed as “1 January 1999”)

- position of the date of assent (it now appears on the front page of each Act)
- punctuation (eg, colons are not used after definitions)
- Parts numbered with roman numerals are replaced with arabic numerals, and all cross-references are changed accordingly
- case and appearance of letters and words, including:
 - format of headings (eg, headings where each word formerly appeared with an initial capital letter followed by small capital letters are amended so that the heading appears in bold, with only the first word (and any proper nouns) appearing with an initial capital letter)
 - small capital letters in section and subsection references are now capital letters
- schedules are renumbered (eg, Schedule 1 replaces First Schedule), and all cross-references are changed accordingly
- running heads (the information that appears at the top of each page)
- format of two-column schedules of consequential amendments, and schedules of repeals (eg, they are rearranged into alphabetical order, rather than chronological).
