ARMY BOARD BILL.

EXPLANATORY MEMORANDUM.

THE sole purpose of this Bill is to provide for the establishment of an Army Board, having (in relation to the Land Forces of the Dominion) functions corresponding to the functions of the Naval Board (in relation to the Naval Forces) and of the Air Board (in relation to the Air Forces).

Many of the existing provisions of the Defence Act are obsolete, but a general revision of the law cannot be undertaken until the Army Board has had an opportunity to review the present system and make recommendations for the reorganization of the Defence Forces, having regard to present-day requirements.

ANALYSIS.

A BILL INTITULED

AN ACT to constitute an Army Board and to define its Title. functions.

BE IT ENACTED by the General Assembly of New 5 Zealand in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:—

1. This Act may be cited as the Army Board Act, Short Title. 1937, and shall be read together with and deemed See Reprint part of the Defence Act, 1909 (hereinafter referred to as ^{of Statutes,} _{Vol. II, p. 575} 10 the principal Act).

2. In this Act—

Interpretation.

"Army" means the Defence Forces established under the principal Act:

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"Board "means the Army Board established under this Act:

"Minister" means the Minister of Defence.

3. (1) There shall from time to time be appointed, A_{rmy} as an officer of the Public Service, a fit and proper person ^{Secretary.} to be called the Army Secretary, who shall have such

20 duties and functions in relation to the Army as the Board may from time to time determine, and such other functions (if any) as may from time to time be prescribed by regulations under the principal Act.

(2) The officer who at the commencement of this Act holds office as the Under-Secretary of Defence shall be deemed to have been duly appointed as the Army Secretary under this Act.

(3) Section thirty-four of the Finance Act, 1930 5 (No. 2), is hereby repealed.

4. (1) There is hereby established a Board, to be called the Army Board.

(2) The Board shall consist of—

- (a) The Minister, who shall be the President of the 10 Board:
- (b) Not more than three other members (being officers of any of His Majesty's Land Forces), who shall from time to time be appointed as members of the Board by the 15 Governor-General, and shall hold office as such during his pleasure:

(c) The Army Secretary.

(3) Three members of the Board shall form a quorum.

(4) The powers of the Board shall not be affected by any vacancy in the membership thereof.

5. The Governor-General may from time to time, by regulations under the principal Act, make provision with respect to the proceedings of the Board. In the 25 absence of such regulations, or in so far as they do not extend, the Board may regulate its own procedure.

6. The Board shall be charged with the administration of the Army and shall have such powers, duties, and functions in relation thereto as may from time to time 30 be conferred on it by regulations under the principal Act and, subject to such regulations or in so far as they do not extend, shall have all such powers as are reasonably necessary for the effective performance of its functions and duties. 35

7. The enactments mentioned in the Schedule hereto are hereby amended in the manner indicated therein.
