The Governor may appoint the person so recommended as Powers of acting 25 an acting member of the Court, and the person so appointed shall have and may exercise all the powers, duties, and functions of a member of the Court (other than the President) until the member for whom he is acting, by writing under his hand, addressed to the Clerk, informs the Clerk that he is able to resume his duties as 30 member of the Court, or until the period for which such lastmentioned member was appointed expires or he otherwise ceases to be a member of the Court.
