A BILL INTITULED

AN ACT in amendment of the Adulteration Prevention Acts. Title.

BE IT ENACTED by the General Assembly of New Zealand in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:—

5 **1.** The Short Title of this Act is “The Adulteration Prevention Amendment Act, 1885.” It shall come into force on the *first* day of *January*, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six. Short Title.

10 **2.** For the purposes of “The Adulteration Prevention Act 1880 Amendment Act, 1883,” and of all other enactments relating to the manufacture of bread, batch loaves and French loaves of bread shall be deemed to be loaves of any shape so baked as to show crumb on any two or more sides thereof; and loaves of any shape so baked as to show crust only on all sides thereof shall be deemed to be fancy bread. Definition of batch loaves, French loaves, and fancy bread.
