DIVORCE AND MATRIMONIAL CAUSES AMENDMENT BILL.

EXPLANATORY MEMORANDUM.

CLAUSES 2 to 7 make special provision to enable women of British nationality who have been married to persons of enemy origin to obtain divorces from their husbands if their husbands leave New Zealand and remain absent therefrom for more than twelve months. By clause 4 it is provided that the fact that the husband may have desired his wife to leave New Zealand with him shall be no defence to a petition. In every such case the petition of the woman is to be granted unless collusion is proved.

Clause 8 alters the law of guardianship with respect to the children of women of British nationality married to husbands of enemy origin. In every such case the mother is constituted the guardian (with the right of custody of the children) unless the Supreme Court makes an order to the contrary.

Clause 9 adopts the provisions of the Matrimonial Causes (Dominion Troops) Act, 1919. This Act confers on competent Courts of the United Kingdom jurisdiction to entertain matrimonial proceedings in respect of marriages contracted during the war by members of His Majesty's Forces domiciled outside the United Kingdom. The Act has no operation in any self-governing dominion until it is specifically applied by the legislature of that dominion.

Clause 10—Commencement of Act: Clause 9 comes into operation immediately on the passing of the Act. The other clauses are postponed until a date to be named by the Governor-General in a Proclamation issued in that behalf.

This PUBLIC BILL originated in the LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL, and, having this day passed as now printed, is transmitted to the HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES for its concurrence.

An Act to amend the Divorce and Matrimonial Causes Act, 1908. Title. BE IT ENACTED by the General Assembly of New Zealand in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as

5 follows :--

1. This Act may be cited as the Divorce and Matrimonial short Title. Causes Amendment Act, 1919, and shall be read together with and deemed part of the Divorce and Matrimonial Causes Act, 1908 (hereinafter referred to as the principal Act).

2. In this Act "person of enemy origin" means a person who Definition of 10 was at any time prior to the twenty-eighth day of June, nineteen expression "person of enemy origin." hundred and nineteen, a subject of any of the States of Germany, Austria, Turkey, or Bulgaria, whether or not such person is or has at any time been, by naturalization or otherwise, a subject of His 15 Majesty.

3. In addition to the rights which the principal Act confers British woman, upon a wife to petition for divorce a woman who is or was by birth a natural-born British subject and is resident in New Zealand (whether origin, may petition or not she is domiciled in New Zealand), and whose husband is a for divorce if her husband leaves New

5. Personal service of a petition presented pursuant to the provisions of this Act shall not be necessary, but such notice by 5 letter or advertisement or otherwise as the Court may direct in each case to be substituted for service shall be given to the respondent of the presentation of the petition.

6. The Court may accept such evidence as it thinks fit, whether strictly legal evidence or not, that the husband is a person of enemy 10 origin.

7. If the Court is satisfied on the evidence that the case for the petitioner has been proved, and does not find that the petition has been presented in collusion with the husband, the Court shall pronounce a decree dissolving the marriage.

8. Where a person of enemy origin is married (whether before or after the passing of this Act) to a woman who is or was by birth a natural-born British subject, the woman shall in all cases be the guardian of the children of the marriage (whether born before or after the passing of this Act) while they are minors, any law to the 20 contrary notwithstanding :

Provided that the Supreme Court may in any particular case direct that the other parent or any other person shall be the guardian or have the custody of all or any of such children.

9. The Imperial Act, the Short Title of which is the Matri-25 monial Causes (Dominion Troops) Act, 1919, conferring jurisdiction on competent Courts in the United Kingdom in matrimonial causes instituted by or against members of His Majesty's Forces, shall apply to New Zealand as from the passing of this Act.

10. This Act (except the *last preceding* section which shall come 30 into operation on the passing of this Act) shall come into operation on a date to be named in that behalf in a Proclamation to be issued by the Governor-General.
