Every covenant, deed, contract, or agreement executed, made, or entered into, or that hereafter may be executed, made, or entered into, in order to enable any person or Court whatsoever to seize, take, levy upon, or sell, under distress, the before-mentioned exempted clothing, bed-clothes, bedding, tools of trade, or furniture, for the purpose of paying, satisfying, or discharging, wholly or in part, any rent, debt, penalty, fine, liability, or obligation due, owing, or incurred, or that may become due or owing, or be incurred, or for any purpose that contravenes or is inconsistent with or repugnant to the provisions of this Act, is hereby declared to be and the same is and shall be null 10 and void:
