DAYLIGHT BAKING.

ANALYSIS.

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A BILL INTITULED

An Act for the Establishment of Daylight Baking.

Title.

BE IT ENACTED by the General Assembly of New Zealand in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as

5 follows:—

1. This Act may be cited as the Daylight Baking Act, 1921.

Short Title.

2. This Act shall come into operation on the first day of February, nineteen hundred and *twenty-two*.

Commencement.

10 3. In this Act "bread" includes bread rolls, cakes, or pastry of any sort or kind.

Interpretation.

4. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in any other Act, it shall not be lawful for any person (whether he is working on his own account or behalf, or for hire or reward, either directly or indirectly) to make or bake bread for trade or sale except between

Hours of baking.

15 the hours of—

(a.) Eight o'clock in the morning and five o'clock in the evening on any day on which a supply for only one day is made or baked;

20 (b.) Eight o'clock in the morning and six o'clock in the evening on any day on which a supply for two or more days is made or baked; or

(c.) Eight o'clock in the morning to twelve noon on the day of the weekly half-holiday.

25 5. Every person who commits an offence against this Act shall be liable to a fine of *twenty* pounds for each such offence.
