This Public Bill originated in the LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL, and, having this day passed as now printed, is transmitted to the House or REPRESENTATIVES for its concurrence.

## A BILL INTITULED

An Acr to amend "The Fisheries Conservation Act, 1884." Title. BE IT ENACTED by the General Assembly of New Zealand in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as fol-5 lows :-

1. The Short Title of this Act is "The Fisheries Conservation Short Title. Act 1884 Amendment Act, 1898."

2. In this Act, if not inconsistent with the context,—

"The principal Act" means "The Fisheries Conservation Act, 1884 ":

"Regulations" means regulations made under the principal Act.

3. The fishing season for trout, perch, and other acclimatised Fishing season for fish shall commence on the first day of October in each year, and trout and perch. 15 shall close on the thirtieth day of April in each year:

Provided always that the Governor in Council may by regulations

further limit or restrict such season within any particular district or part thereof, or as to any particular river or stream.

4. In districts where trout or other acclimatised fish may be Register of fish sold 20 sold, every holder of a license to sell such fish shall keep a book or to be kept. register wherein shall be entered the true name and address, occupation and number of license, of the person or persons from whom he

purchased such trout or other fish, and the name of the river, stream. or lake from which it came.

5. In any regulation hereafter made under the principal Act Governor may the Governor in Council may, upon the written request of any regulate sale of fish. registered Acclimatisation Society, make provision for the sale of trout or other acclimatised fish within the district of such society upon such terms and conditions as shall be specified in such regulation.

Interpretation.

The provisions of such regulation shall apply only to trout or other fish taken from such streams, lakes, or waters as shall be so specified.

Export of trout forbidden.

6. No person shall export any trout or other acclimatised fish from the colony for the purposes of sale, nor buy or sell any such fish for the purposes of such export, under a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

7. (1.) No person shall put, throw, or place, or allow to be put, placed, or thrown, into any river, stream, or lake, or at the mouth, entrance, or outlet of any such river, stream, or lake in which 10 salmon, trout, or other acclimatised fish have been liberated or exist, any explosive substance, sheep-dip, lime, sawdust, or sawmill refuse, wool-scouring or fellmongery refuse, or anything of what nature soever poisonous, deleterious, or noxious to fish: Provided that nothing herein contained shall apply to debris or tailings from 15

(2.) Any person offending against the provisions of this section shall be liable to a penalty of not more than twenty pounds.

8. If any person be convicted of taking or wilfully killing trout or other acclimatised fish by means of lime, dynamite, or other deleterious or explosive material, he shall be liable, in addition to any fine that may be imposed upon him, to imprisonment for any term

not exceeding six calendar months.

9. All trout, salmon, or other acclimatised fish unlawfully taken, had in possession, exposed for sale, consigned for sale, or bought for 25 sale, and all baskets, bags, nets, or other receptacles, gear, tackle, or other apparatus, instrument, or contrivance used in any unlawful fishing or taking of such trout or other fish as aforesaid, whether found on shore or in possession of the person taking the same, or of any other person, or in any vessel or boat, shall be forfeited, and 30 shall be disposed of in such manner as by regulations may be prescribed.

Power of search when offence committed.

10. (1.) Any Stipendiary Magistrate or any two Justices of the Peace, upon information on oath that there is probable cause to suspect that an offence has been committed at any place against this 35 Act or the principal Act, may, by warrant, authorise and empower by name any officer appointed under the principal Act, or any constable, to enter any dwellinghouse, office, or premises for the purpose of detecting such offence.

Seizure of fish and appliances. Ib.

(2.) The person so authorised may at any hour between sunrise 40 and sunset enter into and search any house, shop, office, store, tent, or other premises, and go on board any vessel or boat, and search for, seize, and take away any fish, net, gear, tackle, baskets or receptacle, instrument or contrivance, which he may have reason to believe has respectively been taken or used, or in the opinion of such authorised 45 person is intended to be used contrary to the provisions of the principal Act or this Act or of any regulations made thereunder.

Application of fines and penalties.

11. All fines and penalties which may be recovered or paid under the principal Act or this Act, or under any regulations made thereunder respectively, shall be paid into the Public Account, and 50 without further appropriation shall be applied,—

(1.) In or towards the payment of the salaries of any fisheries officers appointed under the principal Act, and any other expenses of carrying out the provisions of that Act; and

(2.) The balance shall be handed to the treasurer of some registered acclimatisation society in the district in which such fines or penalties shall have been paid or recovered for the purposes of such society.

(3.) If there be more than one such society in a district, then such balance shall be paid to such one or more of them as the Colonial Treasurer may direct, regard being had to the value of the work done by such societies.

(4.) If there be no such society such balance shall form part of the Consolidated Fund.

12. All fees for licenses for fishing for trout, perch, or other Application of fees.

15 acclimatised fish shall be paid to the Society in whose district such licenses are issued, which Society shall have the control of the issue of such licenses.
