A BILL INTITULED

An Act to amend the Social Security Act 1964

BE IT ENACTED by the Parliament of New Zealand as follows:

- 1. Short Title and commencement—(1) This Act may be cited as the Free Public Hospital Services Act 1991, and shall be read together with and deemed part of the Social Security Act 1964 (hereinafter referred to as the principal Act).
 - (2) This Act shall come into force on the 1st day of February 1992.
- 2. Hospital treatment afforded by area health boards—
 (1) The principal Act is hereby amended by repealing section 101 (as substituted by section 3 of the Social Security Amendment Act (No. 3) 1991), and substituting the following section:
- "101. (1) Except to the extent that, in respect of any injury or disease, a hospital patient has recovered or is or has been entitled to recover any compensation under the Workers' Compensation Act 1956 on account of any hospital treatment in a hospital maintained by an area health board, or has recovered or is entitled to recover special damages in respect of any such treatment, no area health board shall demand or accept or be entitled to recover from the patient or any other person, payment for hospital treatment afforded to a hospital patient who is entitled to receive hospital benefits under this

25 Part of this Act.

"(2) Nothing in subsection (1) of this section or in any regulations made under this Act prevents an area health board from accepting from the Crown payments to that area health board in respect of long-term hospital treatment provided by the board for any intellectually handicapped person or physically handicapped person.

"(3) The provisions of subsection (4) of section 92 of this Act shall, with any necessary modifications, apply for the purposes

of this section."

3. Regulations—Section 123 (1) of the principal Act is 10 hereby amended by omitting paragraphs (ba) and (bb).
