LOCAL ELECTIONS AND POLLS AMENDMENT.

ANALYSIS

Title. 1. Short Title. 2. Special voting-papers for absent voters. 3. Offences connected with special voting-papers. Schedule.

A BILL INTITULÊD

AN ACT to amend the Local Elections and Polls Act, 1908. BE IT ENACTED by the General Assembly of New Zealand in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as 5 follows :-

1. (1.) This Act may be cited as the Local Elections and Polls Short Title. Amendment Act, 1921, and shall form part of and be read together with the Local Elections and Polls Act, 1908 (hereinafter referred to as the principal Act).

10 (2) This Act shall commence on the first day of April, nineteen hundred and twenty-two.

2. (1.) An elector of any district, believing that he will be absent special voting from the district in which he is enrolled on the day of the poll, may, papers for absent at any time during two one months preceding the date of the poll,

15 apply in writing (in the form numbered (1) in the Schedule hereto) to the Returning Officer for a special voting-paper (in the form numbered (2) in the Schedule hereto) or in the form numbered (6) in the Second Schedule to the principal Act, and such application shall be attested by the Returning Officer, a Justice of the Peace, a Postmaster, or 20 other responsible Government officer.

(2.) On receipt of such application the Returning Officer, on being satisfied of the good faith of the applicant and that the applicant's name is on the roll of the district, shall issue and forward post to the address mentioned in the application to such applicant a

25 special voting-paper, and on the closing of the nomination he shall issue and post to the same address to the applicant the names of the candidates nominated.

(3.) For the purpose of exercising his vote the holder of a special voting-paper shall record his vote upon such voting-paper by writing 30 thereon the names of the candidate-or candidates for whom he wishes to

record his vote all the candidates and deleting therefrom the names of

such candidates for whom he does not desire to record his vote, or by voting for or against the proposal stated on the voting-paper, and shall cause the voting-paper to be transmitted to the Returning Officer so as to reach him before the time appointed for the closing of the poll.

(4.) The Returning Officer, upon receipt of special voting-papers, shall retain them safely and secretly until the day of the poll, and before the termination thereof shall place them in a ballot-box prior to the opening of the ballot-boxes.

3. Every person is liable to a fine of *fifty* pounds or to imprison- 10 ment for *six* months who—

- (a.) Wrongfully obtains a special voting-paper; or
- (b.) Having wrongfully obtained the same, records his vote thereunder; or
- (c.) Claims to record his vote by virtue of a special voting-paper 15 not issued to him; or
- (d.) Permits a special voting-paper issued to him to be used by any other person.

I VOTE FOR-

The voter is to write in the names of the candidate-(or candidates) for whom he wishes to vote all the candidates, and delete therefrom the names of such candidates for whom he does not wish to record his vote.

The voting-paper is to be transmitted to the Returning Officer so as to reach him before the close of the poll.

Should any of the candidates for whom the elector votes withdraw from the election or not be nominated, this will not invalidate the votes recorded for other candidates.
