ROYAL POWERS BILL

EXPLANATORY NOTE

The purpose of this Bill is to provide for the exercise by Her Majesty the Queen in New Zealand of the statutory powers conferred on the Governor-General.

The Governor-General is the representative of Her Majesty, and all his powers are exercisable by him on Her Majesty's behalf. But in so far as the royal powers are statutory, the New Zealand statutes confer them on the Governor-General without mentioning the Sovereign. This Bill makes it clear that all such powers are exercisable by Her Majesty in person as well as by the Governor-General.

Title 1. Short Title. 2. Exercise of royal powers by Her Majesty the Queen or the Governor-General.

A BILL INTITULED

An Act relating to the royal powers exercisable by Her Title. Majesty the Queen or the Governor-General.

BE IT ENACTED by the General Assembly of New 5 Zealand in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

- 1. This Act may be cited as the Royal Powers short Title. Act 1953.
- 2. (1) It is hereby declared that every power Exercise of 10 conferred on the Governor-General by any enactment royal powers is a royal power which is exercisable by him on behalf the Queen or of Her Majesty the Queen, and may accordingly be the Governor-General. exercised either by Her Majesty in person or by the Governor-General.

15 (2) It is hereby further declared that every reference in any Act to the Governor-General in Council or any other like expression includes a reference to Her Majesty the Queen acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of New Zealand.
