This Public Bill originated in the House of Representatives, and, having this day passed as now printed, is transmitted to the LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL for its concurrence.

## A BILL INTITULED

An Acr to regulate the Importation of certain Seeds, and in particular Title. to require the Treatment of Imported Seeds so as to distinguish them from New-Zealand-grown Seeds.

5 BE IT ENACTED by the General Assembly of New Zealand in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows :---

1. This Act may be cited as the Seeds-importation Act, 1927, Short Title and and shall come into force on the first day of April, nineteen hundred and commencement. 10 twenty-eight.

Interpretation.

2. In this Act, if not inconsistent with the context,—

"Import" includes attempting to import or being concerned in importing:

"Minister" means the Minister of Agriculture:

"Seed" means cocksfoot, lucerne, or white-clover seed, or any other seed declared by the Governor-General in Council to be subject to the provisions of this Act.

3. Nothing in this Act shall apply to the importation of any seed Exception to Act. where the quantity imported does not exceed twenty-eight pounds in 20 weight.

4. (1) There may from time to time be appointed such Inspectors Appointment and as may be required for carrying out the provisions of this Act.

(2) An Inspector may at all reasonable times enter upon any premises or ship or into any conveyance on or in which he has 25 reason to believe there are any imported seeds, for the purpose of inspecting such seeds.

Regulations.

5. (1) Save with the consent in writing of the Minister previously obtained, no person shall import any seed into New Zealand unless the contents of each package of the seed have been treated in manner prescribed so as to render the seed distinguishable from seed of the same kind not so treated.

(2) A certificate that the seed has been treated as aforesaid shall

accompany the seed.

6. If any seed is imported contrary to the provisions of this Act it shall be either reshipped from New Zealand or treated or disposed of in such manner as the Minister directs, at the expense in all things of 10 the person importing the seed.

7. Every person who sells in New Zealand or has in his possession for sale any seed imported contrary to the provisions of this Act, knowing in any such case that the same has been so imported, commits

an offence and is liable to a fine of fifty pounds.

8. The Governor-General may from time to time, by Order in Council, make regulations for any of the following purposes:—

(a) Prescribing the manner in which seeds shall be treated before

being imported into New Zealand:

(b) Prescribing the form of the certificate to accompany seeds 20 imported into New Zealand, and the person or persons by whom the certificate shall be signed:

(c) Providing for the examination of imported seeds at ports of entry and for the issue to importers of permits to land the

seeds:

(d) Prescribing specified ports to be the only ports of entry for seeds:

(e) Prescribing fines not exceeding twenty pounds for a breach of any

regulation:

(f) Generally for any other matters for which regulations are contemplated or required by this Act or which are deemed 30 to be necessary for the efficient administration thereof.

(2) All such regulations shall be published in the Gazette, and shall within fourteen days after the publication thereof be laid before Parliament if sitting, or, if not, then within fourteen days after the

commencement of the next ensuing session.

. 9. The Governor-General may from time to time, by Order in Council, declare the seed of any plant other than those referred to in section two hereof to be subject to the provisions of this Act.

Governor-General may declare other seeds subject to Act.
