## A BILL INTITULED

An Act to grant Representation to Seamen in the House of Repre-Title. sentatives.

WHEREAS, from the nature of their avocation, seamen belonging to Preamble. 5 the Colony of New Zealand are prevented from voting at the election of members of the House of Representatives: And whereas every class in the community should be represented in Parliament: And whereas it is desirable that special provision should be made for the representation of seamen in the House of Representatives:

BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED by the General Assembly of New Zealand in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as

follows:—

1. The Short Title of this Act is "The Seamen Representa- short Title. tion Act, 1885."

2. In this Act, if not inconsistent with the context,— No. 41—2.

Interpretation...

"Master" means and includes every person (except a pilot)

having command or charge of any ship:

"Seaman" means and includes every person employed or engaged in any capacity on board any ship who has been at sea for two years, and who is not an alien, and who has not been convicted of treason, felony, or any infamous offence, unless he has been pardoned or has served the term of imprisonment to which he was sentenced:

"Ship" means and includes every description of vessel used

in navigation, not propelled by oars.

3. After the dissolution or expiration of the present Parliament there shall be chosen by the seamen, as hereinafter mentioned, one member of the House of Representatives, and such member shall be in addition to the number of members provided by "The Representation Act, 1881," or any Act amending the same, and in addition to the 15

members elected for main electoral districts. Seamen qualified

4. Every seaman of the age of twenty-one years or upwards, having been six months in the Colony of New Zealand or six months sailing as a seaman on board any ship registered in or owned in the Colony of New Zealand, and whose name is registered as hereinafter 20 mentioned, shall be qualified to be an elector and to vote at the elec-

tion of the member granted by this Act.

5. Every person competent to be an elector under this Act, or to be an elector under any Act providing for the qualification of electors of members for the House of Representatives, and not disqualified 25 under "The Public Offenders Disqualification Act, 1867," or any Act amending or continuing the same, shall be competent to be elected a member under this Act.

6. Any member elected to be a member under this Act shall not cease to be a member on the ground that he has ceased to be an 30 elector.

Preparation of lists.

7. The Collectors of Customs at each port shall, immediately after the passing of this Act, and thereafter from year to year, prepare lists showing the seamen shipped from their respective ports who have been six months in the Colony of New Zealand, or six 35 months sailing on board any ship registered in the Colony of New Zealand, and shall keep a copy thereof in the Customs Office for reference.

Claims to have name placed on roll.

8. Every person qualified to be an elector, whose name is not on the list of any Collector of Customs, but who desires to have his 40 name placed on a list, may make a claim and declaration in the form or to the effect set forth in the First Schedule to this Act. Such claim and declaration may be delivered at the office of such Collector of Customs, or sent through the post directed to him.

9. Sections eight, nine, ten, eleven, twelve, thirteen, fourteen, 45 fifteen, sixteen, seventeen, eighteen, nineteen, and twenty of "The Registration of Electors Act, 1879," shall apply to and be incorporated with this Act, with the exception that where the word "Registrar" occurs therein the words "Collector of Customs" shall

be substituted and read in lieu thereof.

10. The lists shall, one month after they have been begun to be prepared by the Collector of Customs, with the additions and alterations (if any) within that month or ordered by any Resident Magistrate, be forwarded to the Secretary of Customs at Wellington.

Every person whose name is put on the roll at any time New electors may after one set of electoral rights has been issued, but before the have electoral rights issued. succeeding set is ready for issue, shall be entitled to have an electoral right issued to him within fourteen days after his name is put on the roll; but all electoral rights to be issued in pursuance of this clause 20 shall only be in force until the next issue of electoral rights.

15. The provisions of "The Regulation of Elections Act, 1881," "Regulation of except so far as modified by this Act, shall in every respect apply to Elections Act, 1881," to apply. the elections under this Act.

16. The Secretary of Customs and each Collector of Customs Returning Officers 25 shall respectively be Returning and Deputy Returning Officers under appointed. this Act.

17. The nomination of a member shall be as follows: Any Nominations. seaman qualified as an elector may, by writing under his hand, nominate a person qualified to be elected as a candidate; and if 30 this nomination be signed by two other seamen qualified as electors, and delivered to the Returning Officer or his Deputy on or before the day appointed for that purpose, the person nominated shall be deemed to be duly nominated.

18. If more than one person be nominated, a poll shall be Poll to be taken. 35 taken.

19. The poll shall be taken by ballot, and every customhouse Polling-places. in the colony shall be a polling-place; and the Governor may, in places where there is no customhouse, appoint places for the taking of the poll, and may appoint Returning Officers thereat.

21. At every polling-place there shall be a copy of the roll, and Person voting to no person shall be permitted to vote unless he produces his electoral right. right; but no seaman shall vote by virtue of this Act if he has within 45 six months before an election under this Act voted by virtue of the residential qualification mentioned in "The Qualification of Electors

22. On production by an elector of his electoral right, and on Electoral right of being satisfied that the name of such elector appears on the roll, vote to be indorsed by Returning 50 and that he is the person whose name is on the electoral right, and officer. that he has not previously voted at the election, nor voted on any residential qualification within six months prior to the day of tendering his vote on his seaman's right, the Returning or Deputy Returning

Officer shall give such elector a voting-paper, and shall endorse the electoral right thus: "Voted; election held from and the date of the said voting, and sign his name, and seal or stamp

Every master of a ship which happens to be in a port where 5 there is a polling-booth, at a time when there is a poll being taken under this Act, shall, at the request of any of the crew being electors, allow such person or persons to go ashore and vote; and every master refusing as aforesaid to permit any of his crew to vote shall be liable to one month's imprisonment with hard labour.

24. Any person who may lose his electoral right shall be entitled to a duplicate thereof on the payment of two shillings and making the declaration in the Third Schedule hereto.

25. Any person who wilfully makes a false declaration in respect of any of the particulars required to be stated in any claim or de- 15 claration under this Act shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds, or to any term not exceeding three months' imprisonment.
