A BILL INTITULED

AN ACT to regulate the Width of Streets and Roads. Title. BE IT ENACTED by the General Assembly of New Zealand in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:—

1. The Short Title of this Act is "The Width of Streets and Short Title.

2. Every street or road on lands surveyed or laid out after the Streets and roads to

passing of this Act shall be not less than sixty-six feet in width.

with any such plan, deed, or instrument to make and sign a statutory declaration as to the date or time when any such street or road was

actually laid out, surveyed, or dedicated to the public.

4. This Act shall not apply within any borough constituted under Limitation of Act. 20 "The Municipal Corporations Act, 1876," or any Act or Ordinance of any Provincial Council; and it shall not repeal or affect in any way "The Plans of Towns Regulation Act, 1875," nor shall it apply to any street or road which a Road Board or other local body or private individual shall purchase or otherwise acquire through lands of which 25 such road previously formed a part.
