Any dog [seized by the police or by any local authority under the provisions of section thirteen of "The Dog Registration Act, 1880," and] without a collar having the proper registration-label thereon, instead of being destroyed as provided by section thirteen of the said Act, may be seized by the police or by any one duly authorized by the local authority, and, if not claimed by the owner within forty-eight hours from the time of such seizure, may be sold and disposed of to any person, and such person shall thereupon become the lawful owner of the same; and the proceeds of any such sale as aforesaid shall be paid into the funds of the local authority.

The Honourable Mr. Menzies, when in Committee, to move the following

Whenever a dog is duly registered under the said Act, it shall be lawful for the owner to affix the registration-label obtained from the registration office on any dog-collar other than one obtained from the said office.
