LICENSING AMENDMENT BILL (No. 2).

Mr. WILFORD, in Committee, to move the following amendments:—

Clause 3, subclause (1): To omit paragraphs (a) and (b), and substitute the following:—

- (a) The question (hereinafter referred to as “national prohibition”) whether the electors declare that all licenses of any description then existing shall, unless sooner forfeited or determined in due course of law, continue in force for the respective periods for which they were granted, and then lapse, and shall not be renewed, and no new licenses granted;
- (b) The question (hereinafter referred to as “national continuance”) whether the electors declare against national prohibition as provided by the *last preceding* paragraph.

First Schedule: To omit the First Schedule as printed, and substitute the following:—

FIRST SCHEDULE.

Question: ARE YOU IN FAVOUR OF NATIONAL PROHIBITION?

Answer: I VOTE YES.

Answer: I VOTE NO.

DIRECTIONS.

The voter must strike out the answer for which he does not wish to vote.
If the voter strikes out both or fails to strike out one of the answers the voting-paper will be void, and his vote will not be recorded.

The voting-paper so marked is to be placed by the voter in the ballot-box prepared for it.
The voter is not allowed to take this voting-paper out of the polling-booth.
