PAYMENT OF JURORS BILL.

Mr. W. HUTCHISON, in Committee, to move the following amendments:—

In clause 3, line 10, omit the word "grand."

In the same clause, line 11, strike out the words "seven shillings and sixpence to each juror," and insert instead thereof the words "ten shillings each."

In the same clause, line 12, for the word "he" substitute "they."

And, at the close of the same clause (3), add the following words: "or in travelling to or from the same."

The clause will then read thus:—

All jurors, whether special or common jurors, shall be paid the sum of ten shillings each for every day they may be in attendance upon a Court, or in travelling to or from the same.

COUNTIES ACT 1886 AMENDMENT BILL.

Mr. FLATMAN, in Committee, to move the following new clauses:—

3. The principal Act is hereby amended as follows:—

Section one hundred and fourteen: By the omission of the word "meeting," at the end of the clause, and the addition of the words, "or the object or purport of such business."

Section one hundred and twenty-four: By the omission of the words "by passing of a resolution," in the second line, and the insertion of the words "as follows" in lieu thereof.

Section one hundred and twenty-four, subsection one: By the omission of the word "adopted," and the insertion of the word "passed" in lieu thereof.

Section three hundred and four: By the omission of subsection two.

Section three hundred and eleven, subsection eleven: By the insertion of the following words after the word "employed," in the second line: "or other means of traction."

4. The production of the *Gazette* purporting to contain notification of the approval of the Minister for Public Works of any by-law, and also to contain a copy of the by-law, shall be conclusive evidence that all notices have been duly given, and publications made, and meetings duly convened and held, and resolutions duly passed and confirmed, and all other necessary steps taken and formalities performed that may have been required for the making of any by-law.
