

“The Foreign Jurisdiction Act Amendment Act, 1866.”

AN ACT to amend the Foreign Jurisdiction Act.

1. It shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council from time to time, if and when it seems fit, by Order in Council made under the Foreign Jurisdiction Acts, to assign to or confer on any Court in any of Her Majesty's possessions out of the United Kingdom any jurisdiction, civil or criminal, original or appellate, which Her Majesty in Council might lawfully by any such Order assign to or confer on any Court in any country or place out of Her Majesty's dominions within which Her Majesty has power or jurisdiction, and from time to time by any such Order to make such provisions and regulations as to Her Majesty in Council seem meet respecting the exercise of the jurisdiction so

Power for Queen in Council to assign jurisdiction to Courts in British dominions in cases within Foreign Jurisdiction Acts.

29 & 30 *Vict.*, assigned or conferred, and respecting the enforcement and execution of the judgments, decrees, orders, and sentences of any such Court, and respecting appeals therefrom; and every such Order shall be effectual to vest in the Court to which it relates the jurisdiction expressed to be thereby assigned or conferred, and the same shall be exercised subject and according to the provisions and regulations aforesaid.

Short Titles.

2. This Act may be cited as “The Foreign Jurisdiction Act Amendment Act, 1866;” and the Act of the session of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty’s reign, chapter ninety-four, “to remove Doubts as to the exercise of Power and Jurisdiction by Her Majesty within divers Countries and places out of Her Majesty’s Dominions, and to render the same more effectual,” may be cited as “The Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1843;” and that Act and “The Foreign Jurisdiction Act Amendment Act, 1865,” and this Act, may be cited together, and are in this Act referred to as “the Foreign Jurisdiction Acts.”
