PURSUANT to the Arbitration Clauses (Protocol) and the Arbitration (Foreign Awards) Act 1933, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, hereby makes the following order.

ORDER

1. Title and commencement—(1) This order may be cited as the Arbitration (Foreign Awards) Order 1977.

(2) This order shall come into force on the 1st day of March 1978.

2. Interpretation—In this order “the Convention” means the Convention on the Execution for Foreign Arbitral Awards, signed on the 26th day of September 1927, the terms of which are set forth in the Second Schedule to the Arbitration Clauses (Protocol) and the Arbitration (Foreign Awards) Act 1933.

3. Parties to Convention—The powers specified in the First Schedule to this order are hereby declared to be parties to the Convention.

4. Territories to which Convention applies—The territories specified in the Second Schedule to this order are hereby declared to be territories to which the Convention applies.
