ORDER 1978**

ORDER IN COUNCIL

At the Government House at Wellington this 15th day of May 1978

Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL PRESIDING IN COUNCIL

PURSUANT to the Accident Compensation Act 1972, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, hereby makes the following order.

ORDER

1. Title and commencement—(1) This order may be cited as the Accident Compensation (Prescribed Amounts) Order 1978.

(2) This order shall come into effect on the day after the date of its notification in the *Gazette*.

2. Interpretation—In this order the expression “the Act” means the Accident Compensation Act 1972.

3. Application—(1) For the purposes of clause 4 hereof, this order shall not apply to—

(a) Earnings as an employee paid on or before the 31st day of March 1979;

(b) Earnings as a self-employed person derived during the financial year ending with or before the 30th day of September 1978.

(2) For the purposes of clause 5 hereof, this order shall apply in every case where relevant earnings are to be ascertained in respect of incapacity as a result of an accident that occurs on or after the 1st day of April 1979.

4. Prescribing increased amount for the purposes of section 74—Subject to clause 3 (1) of this order, for the purposes of section 74 of the Act, the prescribed amount shall be \$18,720.

5. Prescribing increased amount for the purposes of section 104—Subject to clause 3 (2) of this order, for the purposes of the Act, the prescribed amount shall be \$360.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

This order increases the amount prescribed for the purposes of sections 74 and 104 of the Accident Compensation Act 1972.
