## ORDER IN COUNCIL

At the Government Buildings at Wellington this 14th day of April 1975

THE RIGHT HON. W. E. ROWLING PRESIDING IN COUNCIL

PURSUANT to the Accident Compensation Act 1972, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, hereby makes the following regulations.

## REGULATIONS

1. Title and commencement—(1) These regulations may be cited as the Accident Compensation Motor Vehicle Levies Regulations 1973, Amendment No. 2, and shall be read together with and deemed part of the Accident Compensation Motor Vehicle Levies Regulations 1973\* (hereinafter referred to as the principal regulations).

(2) These regulations shall come into force on the day after the date of their notification in the Gazette.

2. Further collection fees—The principal regulations are hereby amended by adding the following regulation:

"6. The collection fee to be deducted pursuant to section 102 of the Accident Compensation Act 1972 from the amount of every levy paid under Part IV of that Act shall, for the licensing year commencing on the 1st day of July 1975 and any subsequent licensing year, be 40 cents."

#### EXPLANATORY NOTE

This note is not part of the regulations, but is intended to indicate their general effect.

These regulations prescribe a collection fee of 40 cents which may be deducted by the Post Office under section 102 (2) of the Accident Compensation Act 1972 in respect of every levy which it receives under the motor vehicle accident scheme for the licensing year commencing on 1 July 1975 and any subsequent licensing year.
