THE ARMS EMERGENCY REGULATIONS 1940.

GALWAY, Governor-General ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At the Government House at Wellington, this 2nd day of July, 1940.

Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL IN COUNCIL.

Pursuant to the Emergency Regulations Act, 1939, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, doth hereby make the following regulations.

REGULATIONS.

- 1. These regulations may be cited as the Arms Emergency Regulations 1940.
 - 2. In these regulations, unless the context otherwise requires,—
 "Alien" has the same meaning as in the Alien Control Emergency
 Regulations 1939*:
 - "The Arms Act" means the Arms Act, 1920, and its amendments: Expressions defined in the Arms Act have the meanings so defined.
- 3. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in the Arms Act or in any regulations or notice thereunder, section 7 of the Arms Act shall apply with respect to—
 - (a) The possession by an alien of any shot-gun or ammunition of a kind referred to in subsection (3) of the said section 7, or in section 8 of the Arms Amendment Act, 1921–22:
 - (b) The possession by any person other than a licensed dealer of any explosives of a kind referred to in the said subsection (3) of section 7 of the Arms Act.
- 4. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in subsection (8) of section 9 of the Arms Act, that section shall apply with respect to the possession by an alien of any shot-gun of a kind referred to in the said subsection (8).
