# THE AGREEMENT ON COMMERCE (JAPAN) ORDER 1958

# COBHAM, Governor-General ORDER IN COUNCIL

At the Government House at Wellington this 8th day of September 1958

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL IN COUNCIL

Pursuant to section 5 of the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade Act 1948, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, hereby makes the following order.

### ORDER

- 1. (1) This order may be cited as the Agreement on Commerce (Japan) Order 1958.
- (2) This order shall come into force on the date of the signature of an agreement, to be known as the Agreement on Commerce between Japan and New Zealand, providing, inter alia, for most-favourednation Tariff treatment to be accorded to Japan.
- 2. The duties and exemptions from duty provided for in accordance with Part I of Schedule XIII to the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade, as set out in the First Schedule to the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade Act 1948, and as from time to time modified (whether before or after the commencement of this order), and the duties and exemptions from duty provided for in accordance with the Second Schedule to that Act, as from time to time modified as aforesaid, are hereby applied to goods being the produce or manufacture of Japan.
- 3. The provisions of this order shall be subject to the provisions of section 143 of the Customs Act 1913.
- 4. All duties of Customs that have become due and payable and all penalties and forfeitures that have been incurred before the commencement of this order shall be recovered and enforced as if this order had not been made.

#### EXPLANATORY NOTE

This note is not part of the order, but is intended to indicate its general effect. This order extends most-favoured-nation Tariff treatment to Japan.
