HER EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL IN COUNCIL

PURSUANT to section 167 of the Accident Rehabilitation and Compensation Insurance Act 1992, Her Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, hereby makes the following regulations.

REGULATIONS

1. Title and commencement—(1) These regulations may be cited as the Accident Rehabilitation and Compensation Insurance (Employment Premiums) Regulations 1993.

(2) These regulations shall come into force on the 1st day of April 1994.

2. Interpretation—In these regulations, unless the context otherwise requires,—

"The Act" means the Accident Rehabilitation and Compensation Insurance Act 1992:

- "Full-time employment" means, in relation to any earner, employment for an average of not less than 30 hours per week for the income year, or a lesser number of hours per week for the income year if such lesser hours are defined as full-time employment in an employment contract due to the particular nature of that employment:
- "Industrial activity" means the industry, trade, business, profession, or undertaking of an employer or a person who has earnings other than as an employee as determined by the nature of the goods or services produced or rendered by that employer or person who has earnings other than as an employee; or if no goods or services are produced or rendered, as determined by the nature of the employment.

3. Classification of earners for premium purposes—For the purposes of calculation and payment of premiums under the Act—

(a) Earners shall be classified into their respective categories of-

- (i) Persons who have earnings other than as an employee; and (ii) Employees; and
- (b) Except as provided in regulations 4 and 6 of these regulations employees shall be also classified according to the description of industrial activity, as set out in the Schedule to these regulations, which most accurately describes their employer's industrial activity, or where, because of the nature of the employee's work within a particular description of an industrial activity of an employer, more than one division is prescribed in relation to that particular description, shall be classified in the division within that description which is appropriate to the nature of their work; and
- (c) Except as provided in regulations 5 and 7 of these regulations, persons who have earnings other than as an employee shall be also classified according to the description or division of industrial activity, as set out in the Schedule to these regulations, which most accurately describes their industrial activity.

4. Classification where employer engaged in 2 or more industrial activities—(1) Subject to regulation 6 of these regulations, where an employer is engaged in 2 or more industrial activities and—

- (a) Maintains separate accounting records for the purposes of managing and operating each activity; and
- (b) Maintains records which clearly separate to each industrial activity the earnings of employees engaged solely in that activity,—

then, for the purpose of calculation and payment of premiums, the employees so employed shall be classified in the employer's industrial activity in which they are so recorded.

(2) Where an employer is engaged in 2 or more industrial activities and does not maintain records as specified in paragraphs (a) and (b) of subclause (1) of this regulation, all employees shall be classified in the industrial activity for which the highest rate of premium is prescribed by these regulations.

5. Classification where person who has earnings other than as an employee engaged in 2 or more industrial activities—Where a person who has earnings other than as an employee is engaged in 2 or more industrial activities, that person shall, for the purpose of calculation and payment of premiums, be classified in the description or division of those industrial activities for which the highest rate of premium is prescribed.

6. Classification where employee does not undertake work normally performed—Where an employee does not actually undertake work normally performed by employees engaged in the employer's industrial activity, or any division of that industrial activity, but the employee's work contributes to or services that industrial activity or division, then, for the purposes of calculation and payment of premiums, that employee shall be classified in that description or division of the employer's industrial activity:

Provided that, if such an employee is engaged in work which contributes to or services 2 or more of the employer's industrial activities, that employee shall be classified, for the purpose of calculation and payment of premiums, in the description or division of those industrial activities to which the employee's work contributes or services and for which the highest rate of premium is prescribed by these regulations.

7. Power of Corporation to determine description—Where there is no description set out in these regulations describing the industrial activity of an employer or of a person who has earnings other than as an employee, or where there is doubt as to the appropriate description, the Corporation, on application by the employer or person who has earnings other than as an employee, shall determine a description for the purpose of calculation and payment of premiums.

8. Rates—(1) Pursuant to sections 101 and 102 of the Act, the rates of premiums payable in respect of earnings as an employee or as a person who has earnings other than as an employee shall be—

- (a) In respect of earnings as an employee or as a person who has earnings other than as an employee, at the rate set out in the Schedule to these regulations in relation to the particular description or division of industrial activity in which the employee or person who has earnings other than as an employee has been classified as aforesaid, which rate is expressed as dollars per 100 dollars of those earnings; and
- (b) In respect of earnings as an employee or as a person who has earnings other than as an employee where the Corporation, under regulation 7 of these regulations, determines a description for the purpose of calculation and payment of premiums, at a

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rate per 100 dollars of earnings fixed by the Corporation at the time of making the determination.

(2) All rates of premiums prescribed by subclause (1) of this regulation are exclusive of any goods and services tax that may be payable under the Goods and Services Tax Act 1985.

9. Minimum premium payable by persons who have earnings other than as an employee—(1) Except as provided in subclause (2) of this regulation, there shall be payable by every person in full-time employment who has earnings other than as an employee, and whose total earnings are less than \$12,740 per annum, a minimum premium which shall be the appropriate premium based on earnings other than as an employee of \$12,740 per annum, reduced by the person's earnings as an employee.

(2) There shall be payable by every person in full-time employment who—

(a) Has earnings other than as an employee; and

(b) Has total earnings of less than \$10,190 per annum; and

(c) Satisfies the Corporation that he or she has not attained the age of 20 years at any time during the year—

a minimum premium which shall be the appropriate premium based on earnings other than as an employee of \$10,190 per annum, reduced by the person's earnings as an employee.

10. Maximum earnings on which premium payable—The maximum amount of earnings on which a premium is payable by or in respect of any earner shall be \$76,648 per annum.

11. Revocation and saving—(1) The Accident Rehabilitation and Compensation Insurance (Employment Premiums) Regulations (No. 2) 1992* are hereby revoked.

(2) Notwithstanding subclause (1) of this regulation, the Accident Rehabilitation and Compensation Insurance (Employment Premiums) Regulations (No. 2) 1992* shall continue to apply in respect of the period commencing with the 1st day of April 1993 and ending with the 31st day of March 1994, as if those regulations had not been revoked.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

This note is not part of the regulations, but is intended to indicate their general effect. These regulations, which come into force on 1 April 1994, amend the rates of premiums payable by employers and by persons who have earnings other than as an employee. The minimum premium payable by persons who have earnings other than as an employee.

The minimum premium payable by persons who have earnings other than as an employee and the maximum earnings on which premiums are payable are unchanged.

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
