REGULATIONS

1. Title and commencement—(1) These regulations may be cited as the Customs and Excise Amendment Regulations 1999, and are part of the Customs and Excise Regulations 1996* ("the principal regulations").

(2) These regulations come into force on 1 August 1999.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

This note is not part of the regulations, but is intended to indicate their general effect.

These regulations, which come into force on 1 August 1999, put 2 new declarations into the schedule in the Customs and Excise Regulations 1996 that contains forms (the Second Schedule). The new declarations are in—

- form 3, which asks for information that the New Zealand Customs Service wants from people arriving in New Zealand. The form has gaps that, in the printed version of the form, will be filled by requests for information that other Border Agencies want from arrivals here. The printed form will constitute the New Zealand Passenger Arrival Card; and
- form 3A, which asks for more detailed information about goods from people who have indicated in form 3 that they have goods that may be of interest to the Customs Service, or who are asked by a Customs officer to make the declaration.
