

## THE CO-OPERATIVE COLD STORE COMPANIES ORDER 1975

Pursuant to the Co-operative Companies Act 1956, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, hereby makes the following order.

### ORDER

- 1. Title—This order may be cited as the Co-operative Cold Store Companies Order 1975.
  - 2. Interpretation—For the purposes of this order,—
  - (a) A company is a co-operative cold store company if—
    - (i) Its principal objects include the provision of cold storage facilities for produce held for marketing by its shareholders; and
      - (ii) At least 60 percent of its issued shares are held by persons (being persons primarily engaged in the marketing of produce) for whose produce the cold storage facilities are provided—
      - whether or not the company also has power to provide cold storage facilities for produce of persons other than its shareholders:
  - (b) "Produce" includes fruit of all kinds, fish, poultry, and any other food (as defined in section 2 (1) of the Food and Drug Act 1969).
- 3. Co-operative Companies Act 1956 to apply to co-operative cold store companies—Co-operative cold store companies are hereby declared

to be co-operative companies for the purposes of the Co-operative Companies Act 1956.

# EXPLANATORY NOTE

This note is not part of the order, but is intended to indicate its general effect.

This order declares co-operative cold store companies to be co-operative companies for the purposes of the Co-operative Companies Act 1956.
