ORDER IN COUNCIL

At the Government House at Wellington this 29th day of September
1975

Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL BY HIS DEPUTY IN COUNCIL

PURSUANT to the Co-operative Companies Act 1956, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, hereby makes the following order.

ORDER

1. Title—This order may be cited as the Co-operative Cold Store Companies Order 1975.

2. Interpretation—For the purposes of this order,—

(a) A company is a co-operative cold store company if—

(i) Its principal objects include the provision of cold storage facilities for produce held for marketing by its shareholders; and

(ii) At least 60 percent of its issued shares are held by persons (being persons primarily engaged in the marketing of produce) for whose produce the cold storage facilities are provided—

whether or not the company also has power to provide cold storage facilities for produce of persons other than its shareholders:

(b) “Produce” includes fruit of all kinds, fish, poultry, and any other food (as defined in section 2 (1) of the Food and Drug Act 1969).

3. Co-operative Companies Act 1956 to apply to co-operative cold store companies—Co-operative cold store companies are hereby declared

to be co-operative companies for the purposes of the Co-operative Companies Act 1956.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

This order declares co-operative cold store companies to be co-operative companies for the purposes of the Co-operative Companies Act 1956.
