# THE CUSTOMS DUTIES (IRON AND STEEL) SUSPENSION ORDER 1956

### ORDER IN COUNCIL

At the Government House at Wellington this 27th day of June 1956

Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL IN COUNCIL

PURSUANT to section 12 of the Customs Amendment Act 1921, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, and being satisfied that the existing duties are likely to operate in an injurious manner generally to the public interest, hereby makes the following order.

# ORDER

1. (1) This order may be cited as the Customs Duties (Iron and Steel) Suspension Order 1956.

(2) This order shall come into force on the 1st day of July 1956.

2. This order applies to all duties of Customs, including surtax and primage duty, and whether imposed by—

- (a) The existing Tariff (being the First Schedule to the Customs Acts Amendment Act 1934); or
- (b) Part I or Part II of Schedule XIII to the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade, as set out in the First Schedule to the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade Act 1948; or

(c) Any other enactment.

3. All duties relating to the goods set out in the Schedule hereto are hereby suspended until the end of February 1957.

4. Every suspension of duty hereby effected shall be subject to the provisions of section 143 of the Customs Act 1913.

5. All duties of Customs that have become due and payable and all penalties and forfeitures that have been incurred before the commencement of this order shall be recovered and enforced as if this order had not been made.

6. The Customs Duties Suspension Order (No. 7) 1955\* and the Customs Duties Suspension Order (No. 8) 1955† are hereby revoked.
