THE COLONIAL DETENTION EMERGENCY REGULATIONS 1942

C. L. N. NEWALL, Governor-General. ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At the Government Buildings at Wellington, this 9th day of April, 1942.

Present:

THE RIGHT HON. P. FRASER PRESIDING IN COUNCIL.

PURSUANT to the Emergency Regulations Act, 1939, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, doth hereby make the following regulations.

REGULATIONS.

1. These regulations may be cited as the Colonial Detention Emergency Regulations 1942.

2. Where the Minister of Justice (hereinafter referred to as the Minister) is satisfied that arrangements have been made with the Government of New Zealand by the Government of any other part of His Majesty's dominions for the removal of any person to New Zealand for detention, the Minister may order that that person be taken into custody during his pleasure.

3. Any person taken into custody under these regulations shall be delivered into the custody of the person in control of and shall be detained in such place of detention and under such conditions as the Minister from time to time thinks fit.

4. Any person taken into custody under these regulations may at any time be released by order of the Minister.

5. Any person taken into custody under these regulations may at any time, by order of the Minister, be placed on board any ship or aircraft about to leave New Zealand, and detained there until the ship or aircraft has left New Zealand.

6. In making any order under these regulations in respect of any person the Minister shall act in accordance with any arrangements made with the Government concerned with the removal of that person to New Zealand, and the Minister shall be deemed to be acting in an executive and not in a judicial capacity.
