# THE CUSTOMS DUTIES SUSPENSION ORDER (NO. 4) 1952

# FREYBERG, Governor-General ORDER IN COUNCIL

At the Government House at Wellington, this 28th day of May 1952

### Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL IN COUNCIL

Pursuant to section 12 of the Customs Amendment Act 1921, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, and being satisfied that the existing duties are likely to operate in an injurious manner generally to the public interest, hereby makes the following order.

#### ORDER

1. (1) This order may be cited as the Customs Duties Suspension

Order (No. 4) 1952.

(2) This order in so far as it concerns the goods set out in the First Schedule hereto shall come into force on the 30th day of May 1952, and in so far as it concerns the goods set out in the Second Schedule hereto shall come into force on the 1st day of July 1952.

2. This order applies to all duties of Customs, including surtax and

primage duty, and whether imposed by-

(a) The existing Tariff (being the First Schedule to the Customs

Acts Amendment Act 1934); or

- (b) Part I or Part II of Schedule XIII to the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade, as set out in the First Schedule to the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade Act 1948; or
- (c) The Second Schedule to the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade Act 1948; or

(d) Any other enactment.

3. All duties relating to the goods set out in the Schedules hereto

are hereby suspended until the 31st day of December 1952.

4. Every suspension of duty hereby effected shall be subject to the provisions of section 143 of the Customs Act 1913.

#### FIRST SCHEDULE

## Goods on Which Duties Suspended From 30 May 1952 Until 31 December 1952

357	Metal, viz.:— (7) Shafting, plain rolled, or plain turned, but otherwise unwrought.

# SECOND SCHEDULE

#### Goods on Which Duties Suspended From 1 July 1952 Until 31 December 1952

Tariff Item No.	Goods.
357	Metal, viz.:—  (4) Iron, galvanized or <i>plain</i> black, viz., angle, tee, bar, bolt, channel, rod, and rolled girders; iron girders expanded but otherwise unworked.
	(5) Iron, viz. :—  (a) Sheet, plate (including rolled chequered plates), or hoop (except hoop 6 inches in width or over), plain, whether black, polished, galvanized, plated, tinned, or otherwise coated with metal, n.e.i.  (b) Corrugated sheet iron.
362	Pipes, piping, tubes, and tubing (except coil pipes), viz.:— Ex (3) Wrought iron or steel, screwed; boiler tubes flanged or unflanged; and all pipes, piping, tubes, and tubing n.e.i. (except non-ferrous pipes, piping, tubes, and tubing).

## EXPLANATORY NOTE

[This note is not part of the order, but is intended to indicate its general effect.]

All Customs duties on certain goods were suspended until 30 June 1952 by the Customs Duties Suspension Order 1951 (Serial number 1951/249). The present order further suspends all duties on some of those goods from 1 July 1952 until 31 December 1952. It also suspends immediately all duties on metal shafting, classified under item 357 (7) of the Customs Tariff, until 31 December 1952.
