HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL IN COUNCIL

PURSUANT to section 12 of the Customs Amendment Act 1921, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, and being satisfied that the existing duties are likely to operate in an injurious manner generally to the public interest, hereby makes the following order.

ORDER

1. (1) This order may be cited as the Customs Duties Suspension Order (No. 5) 1952.

(2) This order shall be deemed to have come into force on the 1st day of July 1952.

2. This order applies to all duties of Customs, including primage duty, and whether imposed by the existing Tariff (being the Second Schedule to the Trade Agreement (Australia) Order 1938*) or any other enactment.

3. All duties relating to the goods set out in the Schedule hereto being the produce of the Commonwealth of Australia are hereby suspended until the 15th day of September 1952.

4. Every suspension of duty hereby affected shall be subject to the provisions of section 143 of the Customs Act 1913.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

[This note is not part of the order, but is intended to indicate its general effect.]

This order suspends from 1 July to 15 September 1952 all Customs duties, including primage duty, on potatoes the produce of Australia. These duties were previously suspended from 1 April to 30 June 1952 by the Customs Duties Suspension Order (No. 2) 1952 (Serial number 1952/73).

Issued under the authority of the Regulations Act 1936. Date of notification in *Gazette*: 10 July 1952. These regulations are administered in the Customs Department.
