## THE CUSTOMS DUTIES SUSPENSION ORDER (NO. 7) 1955

### ORDER IN COUNCIL

At the Government House at Wellington this 29th day of November 1955

Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL IN COUNCIL

PURSUANT to section 12 of the Customs Amendment Act 1921, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, and being satisfied that the existing duties are likely to operate in an injurious manner generally to the public interest, hereby makes the following order.

### ORDER

1. (1) This order may be cited as the Customs Duties Suspension Order (No. 7) 1955.

(2) This order shall come into force on the 1st day of January 1956.

2. This order applies to all duties of Customs, including surtax and primage duty, and whether imposed by—

(a) The existing Tariff (being the First Schedule to the Customs Acts Amendment Act 1934); or

(b) Part I or Part II of Schedule XIII to the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade, as set out in the First Schedule to the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade Act 1948; or

(c) Any other enactment.

3. All duties relating to the goods set out in the Schedule hereto are hereby suspended until the end of June 1956.

4. Every suspension of duty hereby effected shall be subject to the provisions of section 143 of the Customs Act 1913.

5. All duties of Customs that have become due and payable and all penalties and forfeitures that have been incurred before the commencement of this order shall be recovered and enforced as if this order had not been made.

6. The Customs Duties Suspension Order (No. 6) 1955\* is hereby revoked.

## SCHEDULE

## GOODS ON WHICH DUTIES SUSPENDED UNTIL END OF JUNE 1956

Tariff Item No.	Goods
357	Metal, viz.— (4) Iron, galvanized or <i>plain</i> black, viz., angle, tee, bar, bolt, channel, rod, and rolled girders; iron girders expanded, but otherwise unworked. (5) Iron, viz.— Ex (a) Sheet, plate (including rolled chequered plates), or hoop (except hoop 6 inches in width or over), <i>plain</i> , whether black, polished, galvanized, plated, tinned, or otherwise coated with metal, n.e.i. (except tinplate) (b) Corrugated sheet iron.

This order continues until 30 June 1956 the existing suspension of all Customs duties on certain types of iron and steel.
