**THE CUSTOMS IMPORT PROHIBITION ORDER 1939, NO. 1.**

GALWAY, Governor-General.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At the Government Buildings at Wellington, this 21st day of February, 1939.

Present :

THE RIGHT HON. M. J. SAVAGE PRESIDING IN COUNCIL.

IN pursuance of the powers and authorities conferred upon him by section 46 of the Customs Act, 1913, and of all other powers and authorities enabling him in this behalf, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, and being of opinion that the prohibition hereinafter enacted is necessary in the public interest, doth hereby order as follows :—

1. This Order may be cited as the Customs Import Prohibition Order 1939, No. 1.

2. The importation is prohibited, save with the consent of the Minister of Customs, and subject to such conditions as he thinks fit to impose, of veterinary biologics.

3. For the purposes of this Order in Council the term “veterinary biologics” includes preparations made from animal glands or tissues, aggressins, serums, viruses, toxins, tuberculin, mallein, Johnin, abortin, vaccines, antigens, bacterins, micro-organisms (whether living or killed), and all products of micro-organisms used or capable of being used in the treatment or diagnosis of diseases of domestic animals and of poultry (including domestic fowls, ducks, geese, and turkeys).

4. This Order in Council shall come into force on the day following notification of the making thereof in the *Gazette*.

Date of notification in *Gazette* : 2nd day of March, 1939.

These regulations are administered by the Customs Department, but applications for permits to import preparations covered by this Order in Council should be made in the first instance to the Director-General, Department of Agriculture, and should be made prior to ordering the goods from abroad.
