## THE CUSTOMS IMPORT PROHIBITION ORDER 1942, NO. 1

## C. L. N. NEWALL, Governor-General. ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At the Government House at Wellington, this 21st day of January, 1942.

## Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL IN COUNCIL.

Pursuant to section 46 of the Customs Act, 1913, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council and being of the opinion that the prohibition hereinafter enacted is necessary in the public interest, doth hereby order as follows:—

- 1. This Order may be cited as the Customs Import Prohibition Order 1942, No. 1.
- 2. This Order in Council shall come into force on the day following notification in the *Gazette* of the making hereof.
- 3. The importation is prohibited, save with the consent of the Minister of Customs, of any treasury notes appearing to be issued by the Government of Hong Kong and any bank-notes appearing to be issued in the Colony of Hong Kong or payable in that colony being notes of any of the banks heretofore authorized by law to issue notes in that colony—namely, the Hong Kong and Shanghai Banking Corporation, the Chartered Bank of India Australia and China and the Mercantile Bank of India.
