

THE CUSTOMS IMPORT PROHIBITION (NEW ZEALAND MONEY) ORDER 1971

ORDER IN COUNCIL

At the Government House at Wellington this 5th day of July 1971

Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL IN COUNCIL

Pursuant to section 48 of the Customs Act 1966, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, and being of opinion that the prohibition hereinafter enacted is necessary in the public interest, hereby makes the following order.

ORDER

- 1. Title—(1) This order may be cited as the Customs Import Prohibition (New Zealand Money) Order 1971.
- (2) This order shall come into force on the day after the date of its notification in the *Gazette*.
- 2. Importation of New Zealand money—The importation of the goods specified in the Schedule hereto is hereby prohibited, except with the consent of the Reserve Bank of New Zealand and subject to such conditions as it thinks fit to impose:

Provided that this prohibition shall not apply to the bringing into New Zealand by travellers of New Zealand money being bank notes in denominations of \$1 or \$2 or \$5 or coin of any denomination.

3. Revocation—The Customs Import Prohibition (New Zealand Money) Order 1966* is hereby revoked.

SCHEDULE

PROHIBITED IMPORTS

New Zealand money, being bank notes and other currency, postal notes, and money orders of New Zealand, and including promissory notes and bills of exchange; but excluding travellers' cheques.
