



## THE CORONERS REGULATIONS 1952, AMENDMENT NO. 2

### ORDER IN COUNCIL

At the Government House at Wellington this 22nd day of December 1954

Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL IN COUNCIL

PURSUANT to the Coroners Act 1951, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, hereby makes the following regulations.

### REGULATIONS

1. (1) These regulations may be cited as the Coroners Regulations 1952, Amendment No. 2, and shall be read together with and deemed part of the Coroners Regulations 1952\* (hereinafter referred to as the principal regulations).

(2) These regulations shall come into force on the 1st day of January 1955.

2. (1) The principal regulations are hereby amended by revoking regulation 15, and substituting the following regulation:

“ 15. Any witness (including a medical witness) who attends at the instance of the police to give evidence at an inquest or to whom the Coroner authorizes payment may be paid fees, allowances, and expenses in accordance with the Witnesses and Interpreters Fees Regulations 1954†, and the provisions of those regulations shall apply accordingly as if references therein to the Court were references to a Coroner:

“ Provided that a medical witness whose evidence relates to a post-mortem examination performed by him shall be entitled under this regulation only to the amount by which the fees payable to an expert witness under the said regulations exceed the sum of £1 1s.”

(2) Regulation 3 of the Coroners Regulations 1952, Amendment No. 1, is hereby consequentially revoked.
