THE COINAGE REGULATIONS 1967, AMENDMENT NO. 2

THE QUEEN'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY IN COUNCIL

PURSUANT to section 34 of the Decimal Currency Act 1964 and the Royal Powers Act 1953, Her Majesty the Queen, acting by and with the advice and consent of Her Executive Council, is pleased to make the following regulations.

REGULATIONS

1. Title—These regulations may be cited as the Coinage Regulations 1967, Amendment No. 2, and shall be read together with and deemed part of the Coinage Regulations 1967* (hereinafter referred to as the principal regulations).

2. Royal Visit Commemorative Dollar—(1) Notwithstanding anything in regulation 2 (a) of the principal regulations, the design for the one-dollar coin to be known as the Royal Visit Commemorative Dollar, to be made and issued in the year 1970, shall be as follows:

- (a) For the obverse impression the effigy of Her Majesty the Queen in profile wearing a diamond tiara of festoons, scrolls, and collet-spikes, with the inscription "Elizabeth II New Zealand" and the date "1970":
- (b) For the reverse impression Mount Cook in light clouds with the words "Mount Cook" above; at the foot of Mount Cook the word "Aorangi"; and at the base of the design the words "One Dollar".

(2) Except as aforesaid, all the provisions of the principal regulations relating to the one-dollar coin shall apply to the coin referred to in subclause (1) of this regulation.

3. Cook Islands Commemorative Dollar—(1) Notwithstanding anything in regulation 2 (a) of the principal regulations, the design for the one-dollar coin to be known as the Cook Islands Commemorative Dollar, to be made and issued in the year 1970, shall be as follows:

- (a) For the obverse impression the effigy of Her Majesty the Queen in profile wearing a diamond tiara of festoons, scrolls, and collet-spikes, with the inscription “Elizabeth II New Zealand” and the date “1970”:
- (b) For the reverse impression the bark *Endeavour* in full sail with a portrait of James Cook to the right of the bark and the words “James Cook” beneath the portrait. There shall be above the bark the words “Cook Islands” and below the bark the words “One Dollar”, with a wave pattern around the periphery of the coin.

(2) Except as aforesaid, all the provisions of the principal regulations relating to the one-dollar coin shall apply to the coin referred to in subclause (1) of this regulation.

4. Ten-cents coin—Regulation 2 of the principal regulations is hereby amended by omitting from paragraph (d) the words “and with the inscription ‘One Shilling’ under the design”.

5. One-dollar coin—Regulation 3 of the principal regulations is hereby amended by revoking paragraph (a), and substituting the following paragraph:

“(a) The one-dollar coin shall have graining on the edge:”.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

This note is not part of the regulations, but is intended to indicate their general effect.

These regulations amend the Coinage Regulations 1967.

Regulation 2 prescribes the design for the Royal Visit Commemorative Dollar to be issued in 1970.

Regulation 3 prescribes the design for the Cook Islands Commemorative Dollar to be issued in 1970.

Regulation 4 provides for the omission of the words “One Shilling” from the design of the 10-cents coin.

Regulation 5 provides for one-dollar coins to have graining on their edges instead of the date of the introduction of decimal currency.
