THE CUSTOMS TARIFF (LEATHER AND LEATHERGOODS) ORDER 1957

ORDER IN COUNCIL

At the Government Buildings at Wellington this 6th day of February 1957

Present:

THE RIGHT HON. S. G. HOLLAND PRESIDING IN COUNCIL

PURSUANT to section 12 of the Customs Amendment Act 1921, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, and being satisfied that the existing duties are likely to operate in an injurious manner generally to the public interest, hereby makes the following order.

ORDER

1. (1) This order may be cited as the Customs Tariff (Leather and Leathergoods) Order 1957.

(2) This order shall come into force on the 8th day of February 1957.

2. The existing Tariff (being the First Schedule to the Customs Acts Amendment Act 1934 as modified by the Customs Tariff Amendment Order 1938 No. 2* and the Customs Tariff Amendment Order (No. 4) 1955⁺) is hereby suspended in so far as it relates to the goods set out in the First Schedule hereto.

3. The exemptions from duty set out in the Second Schedule hereto are hereby created, and the duties set out therein are hereby imposed.

4. Schedule XIII to the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (as set out in the First Schedule to the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade Act 1948 and modified by the Customs Tariff Amendment Order (No. 4) 1955 \dagger) is hereby further modified by the deletion therefrom of the duties set out in the Third Schedule hereto and by the substitution therefor of the duties set out in the Fourth Schedule hereto.

5. The Second Schedule to the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade Act 1948 is hereby modified by the addition thereto of the duties set out in the Fifth Schedule hereto.

6. Every exemption from duty or application of duty hereby effected shall be subject to the provisions of section 143 of the Customs Act 1913.

7. All duties of Customs that have become due and payable and all penalties and forfeitures that have been incurred before the commencement of this order shall be recovered and enforced as if this order had not been made.

8. Nothing in this order shall be deemed to affect the provisions of section 5 of the Customs Acts Amendment Act 1930 in respect of the imposition on any goods affected by this order of surtax upon the duties hereby imposed.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

This note is not part of the order, but is intended to indicate its general effect.

This order provides for Customs Tariff changes in respect of leather and leathergoods on the recommendation of the Board of Trade following public Tariff inquiries and most of the items concerned have been rearranged. Some rates of duty have been increased on dressed bovine cattle leather, persians, certain goat and kid skins, manufactured articles of leather or of plastic sheeting, and on handbags, purses, shopping bags, portmanteaux, and certain other receptacles (not including basketware, wickerware, and receptacles of similar materials). Rates of duty have been reduced on crust or rough tanned leather, and on certain dressed leathers.

New sub-items of Tariff items 203 and 262 have been created to provide for belts (other than apparel) and belting, wholly or partly composed of leather, and toilet sets respectively.
