THE DAIRY FACTORY SUPPLY REGULATIONS 1936, AMENDMENT NO. 3

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL IN COUNCIL

PURSUANT to the Agriculture (Emergency Powers) Act, 1934, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, doth hereby make the following regulations.

REGULATIONS

- 1. (1) These regulations may be cited as the Dairy Factory Supply Regulations 1936, Amendment No. 3, and shall be read together with and deemed part of the Dairy Factory Supply Regulations 1936* (hereinafter referred to as the principal regulations).
- (2) These regulations shall come into force on the seventh day after the date of their notification in the Gazette.
- 2. The principal regulations are hereby amended by inserting after clause 8, the following new clause:—
- "8A. Where milk or cream is supplied for consumption in a milk district constituted under the Milk Act, 1944, and the quantity supplied is in excess of the requirements of the inhabitants of the milk district, and the excess milk or cream is available and intended for delivery to a manufacturing dairy for the purpose of being manufactured into dairy products, the Board shall have power, by notice given to the owner of the excess milk or cream, to direct that the excess milk or cream or any part thereof shall be delivered to any manufacturing dairy or manufacturing dairies specified in the notice in such quantities or proportions as are specified in the notice."

EXPLANATORY NOTE

[This note is not part of the regulations, but is intended to indicate their general effect.]

These regulations confer on the New Zealand Dairy Board power to control the disposal of surplus milk or cream where the milk or cream is supplied for consumption in a milk district and is in excess of requirements and is available and intended for delivery to a manufacturing dairy.
