



THE DRUG TARIFF 1974, AMENDMENT NO. 7

PURSUANT to the Social Security Act 1964, the Minister of Health hereby gives the following direction.

ANALYSIS

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DIRECTION

1. Title and commencement—(1) This direction may be cited as the Drug Tariff 1974, Amendment No. 7, and shall be read together with and deemed part of the Drug Tariff 1974* (hereinafter referred to as the Tariff).

(2) This direction shall come into force on the 1st day of August 1976.

2. Interpretation—Clause 2 (1) of the Tariff shall be read as if the definition of the term "Proprietary preparation" were omitted, and the following definition were substituted:

"'Proprietary preparation' means a pharmaceutical requirement that is supplied by reference to a trade mark or trade name or by reference to the name of its manufacturer."

3. Scope of Tariff—Proviso (b) to clause 3 of the Tariff shall be read as if paragraph (xiii) were omitted, and the following paragraph were substituted:

"(xiii) Proprietary medicines or proprietary articles (other than products that are pharmaceutical requirements specified elsewhere in this Tariff or products to which clause 8 (1A) of this Tariff applies):"

4. Prices for pharmaceutical requirements—Clause 5 of the Tariff shall be read as if subclauses (5) and (7) were omitted and the following subclauses were, respectively, substituted:

“(5) Notwithstanding subclause (4) of this clause, a contractor may charge a customer with—

“(a) The price of any pharmaceutical requirements that are supplied by him in excess of the maximum quantities specified in this Tariff:

“(b) In the case of a proprietary preparation that is specifically ordered by a practitioner and supplied by the contractor or a pharmaceutical requirement referred to in clause 8 (1A) of this Tariff, the excess of the price of the preparation or requirement above the amount payable as calculated in accordance with the Prescription Pricing Schedules and the rules for pricing contained in the Tariff.

“(7) If the Minister at any time gives notice that any part of the Prescription Pricing Schedules is suspended the amount payable to the contractor for the duration of the suspension shall be the appropriate amount specified in that notice.”

5. Computation of selling price—Clause 8 of the Tariff shall be read as if subclause (1) were revoked and the following subclauses were substituted:

“(1) Subject to subclause (1A) of this clause, the selling price shall be determined on the basis of the price charged to contractors for the pharmaceutical requirement in such units as are customarily purchased by a contractor and at such prescription wholesale prices as may from time to time be approved by the Commission. Where necessary, any such prices shall be converted to retail prices in the metric system.

“(1A) In the case of any requirement which, in accordance with the advice of the appropriate committee, has been marked with an asterisk in the First Schedule to the Prescription Pricing Schedules, the selling price shall be such as the Minister may determine after consultation with that committee.”

6. Bulk supply orders and practitioners' supply orders—Clause 15 of the Tariff shall be read as if paragraph (d) were revoked and the following paragraph were substituted:

“(d) In the case of allergy treatment sets, or insulin preparations, 20 percent shall be added to the price charged to the contractor.”

7. Proprietary preparations—The Tariff shall be read as if clause 16 were revoked.

8. Payment for anaesthetic agents—The Tariff shall be read as if clause 23 were revoked and the following clause were substituted:

“23. Payment to a practitioner or to the licensee or manager of a licensed hospital in respect of the types of anaesthetic agents specified in the Schedule to this Tariff shall be the amount or amounts approved from time to time by the Director-General.”

9. Payment for radiographic substances—The Tariff shall be read as if the following clause were inserted after clause 23:

“23A. Payment to a practitioner or to the licensee or manager of a licensed hospital in respect of radiographic substances shall be the amount approved from time to time by the Director-General.”

10. Period and quantity of supply when prescription written by medical practitioner—The Tariff shall be read as if subclauses (1) and (5) of clause 24 were revoked and the following subclauses were, respectively, substituted:

“(1) In the case of a prescription written by a medical practitioner payment may be made pursuant to any one prescription for a quantity of the pharmaceutical requirement so prescribed sufficient to provide treatment for a period not exceeding 5 days in respect of the original supply and a further 5 days in respect of the repeat:

“Provided that, on the contractor supplying a lesser or greater quantity than that prescribed and endorsing the prescription accordingly, payment shall be made to him in respect of the amount so supplied if the quantity prescribed does not coincide with an original pack and the requirement is packed in a collapsible tube, dropper bottle, or other special container from which it is not practicable to dispense the exact quantity.

“(5) Notwithstanding subclauses (1) to (4) of this clause, if a quantity greater than that sufficient for 5 days’ treatment but less than 1 month’s treatment is required, payment may be made for the actual quantity prescribed if the quantity required or the period for which treatment is required is stated by the medical practitioner and if the medical practitioner has endorsed the prescription with the words ‘extended supply’.”

11. Period and quantity of supply when prescription written by dentist—(1) The Tariff shall be read as if clause 25 (1) were revoked and the following subclause were substituted:

“(1) In the case of a prescription written by a dentist payment may be made pursuant to any one prescription for a quantity of the pharmaceutical requirement so prescribed sufficient to provide treatment for a period not exceeding 5 days, or, if the prescription provides for a repeat, for consecutive periods not exceeding 7 days in the aggregate:

“Provided that, on the contractor supplying a lesser or greater quantity than that prescribed and endorsing the prescription accordingly, payment shall be made to him in respect of the amount so supplied if the quantity prescribed does not coincide with an original pack and the requirement is packed in a collapsible tube, dropper bottle, or other special container from which it is not practicable to dispense the exact quantity.”

(2) Clause 25 of the Tariff shall be read as if the following subclauses were added:

“(5) Notwithstanding anything in subclauses (1) to (3) of this clause, where, in the opinion of the prescribing dentist, a patient needs extended treatment therewith for a period of 1 month or more, a supply of sodium fluoride tablets not exceeding a quantity sufficient to provide that patient with treatment for a specified period of from 1 to 3 months may be made on any one prescription; and, if the dentist has endorsed the prescription with the words ‘extended supply’ and has specified on it the period for which that pharmaceutical requirement is to be supplied, payment shall be made in respect of a claim made accordingly:

“Provided that in any case where a patient is receiving an extended supply of sodium fluoride tablets, they shall be dispensed in monthly lots unless—

“(a) The prescribing dentist endorses the prescription with a statement of the period for which each lot is to be dispensed; or

“(b) The contractor or the patient endorses the back of the prescription with a statement of the special reasons why a quantity greater or less than a monthly lot is required to be dispensed.

“(6) A repeat on a prescription that remains unfulfilled after 1 month from the date of the first dispensing of any requirement named in the prescription shall cease to be a charge to the Department. The contractor concerned may submit a claim for part fulfilment of the total quantity ordered in respect of the part that is due for payment.

“(7) A repeat on a prescription endorsed ‘extended supply’ that remains unfulfilled after 3 months from the date of first dispensing of any requirement named in the prescription shall cease to be a charge to the Department. The contractor concerned may submit a claim for the part fulfilment of the total quantity ordered in respect of the part that is due for payment, and payment shall be made accordingly.”

12. Definition of “Anaesthetic gases”—Part I of the Schedule to the Tariff shall be read as if clause 1 were revoked and the following clause were substituted:

“1. ‘Anaesthetic gases’ means that payment will be made to a practitioner who has administered the gas to a person (being neither a patient of a public hospital nor a person for whom the anaesthetic service has been provided either as part of a maternity benefit or as part of a dental benefit under the Social Security (Dental Benefits) Regulations 1960) if the amount specified in clause 22 of this Tariff has been credited to that person’s account.”

13. Definition of “Anaesthetic agent”—Part I of the Schedule to the Tariff shall be read as if clause 2 were revoked and the following clause were substituted:

“2. ‘Anaesthetic agent’ means that payment may be made only to the licensee or manager of a licensed hospital or to a practitioner, who has purchased the pharmaceutical requirement.”

14. Definition of “Intravenous fluids”—Part I of the Schedule to the Tariff shall be read as if clause 7 (c) were revoked and the following paragraph were substituted:

“(c) To a contractor in respect of the cost to him of the pharmaceutical requirement and the dispensing fee, if the requirement is prescribed by a practitioner for the use of a patient on a renal dialysis unit at his own home.”

15. Definition of “Radiographic substance” added to Part I of Schedule to Tariff—Part I of the Schedule to the Tariff shall be read as if the following clause were inserted after clause 10:

“10A. ‘Radiographic substance’ means that payment may be made only to the licensee or manager of a licensed hospital or to a practitioner, who has purchased the pharmaceutical requirement.”

16. Definition of “Retail Pharmacy—specialist”—Part I of the Schedule to the Tariff shall be read as if clause 11 were revoked and the following clause were substituted:

“11. ‘Retail Pharmacy—specialist’ means that payment may be made only when the pharmaceutical requirement concerned is supplied on a prescription, or practitioner’s supply order, signed by a specialist, or, in the case of treatment recommended by a specialist, a prescription or practitioner’s supply order signed by a practitioner and endorsed with the words ‘recommended by [*Name of specialist*]’.”

17. Certain pharmaceutical requirements deleted from Part II of Schedule to Tariff—Part II of the Schedule to the Tariff shall be read as if the pharmaceutical requirements specified in the First Schedule to this direction were deleted.

18. Certain pharmaceutical requirements added to Part II of Schedule to Tariff—Part II of the Schedule to the Tariff shall be read as if it included the pharmaceutical requirements specified in the Second Schedule to this direction and as if those requirements were available to the extent specified in that Schedule.

19. Certain manufacturers added to Part III of Schedule to Tariff—Part III of the Schedule to the Tariff shall be read as if it included the manufacturers named in the Third Schedule to this direction.

20. Revocation—The Drug Tariff 1974, Amendment No. 6*, is hereby revoked; and the Drug Tariff 1974 shall be read as if this direction were the only amendment of the Tariff that had ever been made.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

This note is not part of the direction, but is intended to indicate its general effect.

This direction amends the Drug Tariff 1974 so as to make minor alterations in the general rules affecting the Drug Tariff and the definitions in Part I of the Schedule, and so as to provide for deletions from, and additions to, the list of pharmaceutical requirements in Part II of the Schedule. Deleted items do not in all cases disappear from the list. Certain of them are included with some variation in the Schedule of additions.

1. Some trade names for drugs that are included in the Drug Tariff for the first time are:
