

THE DRUG TARIFF 1979, AMENDMENT NO. 1

Pursuant to section 99 of the Social Security Act 1964, the Minister of Health hereby gives the following direction.

ANALYSIS

DIRECTION

- 1. Title and commencement—(1) This direction may be cited as the Drug Tariff 1979, Amendment No. 1, and shall be read together with and deemed part of the Drug Tariff 1979* (hereinafter referred to as the Tariff).
- (2) This direction shall come into force on the 1st day of August 1979.
- 2. Definition of "Retail Pharmacy—Dermatologist, ophthalmologist, plastic surgeon, or oncologist"—Part I of the Schedule to the Tariff shall be read as if, for clause 10, there were substituted the following clause:
- "10. 'Retail Pharmacy—dermatologist, ophthalmologist, plastic surgeon, or oncologist' means that payment may be made only when the pharmaceutical requirement concerned is supplied on a prescription, or practitioners' supply order, signed by a specialist in dermatology, in ophthalmology, in plastic surgery, or in oncology."
- 3. Certain pharmaceutical requirements deleted from Part II of Schedule to Tariff—Part II of the Schedule to the Tariff shall be read as if the pharmaceutical requirements specified in the First Schedule to this direction were deleted.
- 4. Certain pharmaceutical requirements added to Part II of Schedule to Tariff—Part II of the Schedule to the Tariff shall be read as if it included the pharmaceutical requirements specified in the Second Schedule to this direction and as if those requirements were available to the extent specified in that Schedule.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

This note is not part of the direction, but is intended to indicate its general effect.

This direction makes 2 amendments to the Drug Tariff 1979. First, it adds ophtalmologists to those specialists (at present dermatologists, plastic surgeons, and oncologists) on whose prescriptions certain pharmaceutical requirements may be supplied free of charge.

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Secondly, it provides for deletions from and additions to, the list of pharmaceutical requirements in Part II of the Drug Tariff 1979. Deleted items do not in all cases disappear from the list, as they are sometimes added again in a varied form.
