



THE DRUG TARIFF 1984, AMENDMENT NO. 7

PURSUANT to section 99 of the Social Security Act 1964, the Minister of Health hereby gives the following direction.

DIRECTION

1. Title and commencement—(1) This direction may be cited as the Drug Tariff 1984, Amendment No. 7, and shall be read together with and deemed part of the Drug Tariff 1984* (hereinafter referred to as the Tariff).

(2) This direction shall come into force on the 1st day of August 1986.

(3) For the purpose of applying the Tariff after the commencement of this direction, but without affecting the validity or consequences of anything that has been done before the commencement of this direction, the Tariff shall have effect as if this amendment were the only amendment to the Tariff that had ever been made.

2. Interpretation—(1) Clause 2 (1) of the Tariff shall be read as if, after the definition of the term “The Act”, there were inserted the following definition:

“ ‘Area Health Board’ means an Area Health Board under the Area Health Boards Act 1983:”.

(2) The said clause 2 (1) shall be read as if, for the definition of the term “Outpatient”, there were substituted the following definition:

“ ‘Outpatient’ means any person being treated at any hospital under the control of a Hospital Board or an Area Health Board, otherwise than as an inmate:”.

3. Prices for pharmaceutical requirements—(1) Clause 5 (5) of the Tariff shall be read as if there were inserted, after paragraph (a), the following paragraph:

“(aa) Any amount by which payment has been reduced under clause 7 (1) (b), clause 21 (3) (b), or clause 22 (1) (b) of this direction:”.

(2) Clause 5 (6) of the Tariff shall be read as if, for the expression “15”, there were substituted the expression “20”.

(3) Clause 5 (7) of the Tariff shall be read as if, for the expression “35”, there were substituted the expression “40”.

4. Calculation of payments—The Tariff shall be read as if, for clause 7, there were substituted the following clause:

“7. (1) Payment for a pharmaceutical requirement when dispensed shall be calculated by—

“(a) Adding together—

“(i) The total selling price of the requirement’s ingredients; and

“(ii) The amount specified in the Second Schedule to the Prescription Pricing Schedules for the average container charge; and

“(iii) If the requirement is dispensed in a container having a child-resistant closure, the amount specified in that schedule for such a closure; and

“(iv) The appropriate professional fee set out in the Third Schedule to the Prescription Pricing Schedules; and

“(v) If that requirement is the residue of a quantity of a Class B controlled drug that was prescribed as an initial supply but could not, at the time of initial dispensing, be supplied in that quantity, the appropriate additional fee set out in that schedule; and

“(vi) The amount (if any) of goods and services tax payable under the Goods and Services Tax Act 1985 in respect of the dispensing of that requirement; and

“(b) Subject to subclause (2) of this clause, subtracting \$1.

“(2) In calculating payment for a pharmaceutical requirement, \$1 shall not be subtracted—

“(a) If—

“(i) The person for whom that requirement is prescribed belongs to a class of person specified in subsection (1A) or subsection (1B) of section 93 of the Act; and

“(ii) The prescription concerned is either endorsed to that effect by the practitioner concerned or (where the contractor concerned is satisfied that the endorsement or lack of endorsement of the practitioner concerned is erroneous) endorsed to that effect and initialled by the contractor; and

“(iii) That prescription relates only to requirements prescribed for that person; or

“(b) If—

“(i) The person for whom that requirement is prescribed does not belong to a class of person specified in subsection (1A) or subsection (1B) of section 93 of the Act; and

“(ii) The contractor concerned is satisfied that the Director-General has exempted that person from the payment of a flat prescription charge; and

“(iii) The prescription relates only to requirements prescribed for that person; or

“(c) If—

“(i) The person for whom that requirement is prescribed does not belong to a class of person specified in subsection (1A) or subsection (1B) of section 93 of the Act; and

“(ii) The contractor concerned is not satisfied that the Director-General has exempted that person from the payment of a flat prescription charge; and

“(iii) That requirement is a contraceptive; and

“(iv) The prescription concerned relates only to contraceptives prescribed for that person.”

5. Payment for syringes and needles—Clause 21 of the Tariff shall be read as if, for subclause (3), there were substituted the following subclauses:

“(3) Payment of any such claim shall be computed by—

“(a) Adding together—

“(i) The cost price of the requirements concerned; and

“(ii) 15 percent of that price; and

“(iii) The appropriate professional fee; and

“(iv) The amount (if any) of goods and services tax payable under the Goods and Services Tax Act 1985 in respect of the provision of those requirements; and

“(b) Subject to subclause (4) of this clause, subtracting \$1.

“(4) In calculating payment for any such claim, \$1 shall not be subtracted if the person for whom the requirement concerned is prescribed belongs to a class of person specified in subsection (1A) or subsection (1B) of section 93 of the Act and the said form is endorsed to that effect by the contractor concerned.”

6. Payment for plastic syringes—The Tariff shall be read as if, for clause 22, there were substituted the following clause:

“22. (1) Payment to a contractor for plastic syringes allowed under the Schedule to this direction shall be computed by—

“(a) Adding together—

“(i) The cost price of those syringes; and

“(ii) 15 percent of that price; and

- “(iii) The appropriate professional fee; and
- “(iv) The average container charge; and
- “(v) The amount (if any) of goods and services tax payable under the Goods and Services Tax Act 1985 in respect of the provision of those syringes; and
- “(b) Subject to subclause (2) of this clause, subtracting \$1.
- “(2) In calculating payment for plastic syringes, \$1 shall not be subtracted if—
- “(a) The person for whom that requirement is prescribed belongs to a class of person specified in subsection (1A) or subsection (1B) of section 93 of the Act and the prescription concerned is either endorsed to that effect by the practitioner concerned or (where the contractor concerned is satisfied that the endorsement or lack of endorsement of the practitioner concerned is erroneous) endorsed to that effect and initialled by the contractor concerned; and
- “(b) The prescription concerned relates only to requirements prescribed for that person.”

7. Period and quantity of supply where prescription written by medical practitioner—The Tariff shall be read as if, for clause 25, there were substituted the following clause:

“25. In the case of a prescription for a pharmaceutical requirement (other than an oral contraceptive) written by a medical practitioner, the following provisions shall apply:

- “(a) Payment may be made for only such amount of the requirement as is sufficient to provide treatment for a period not exceeding 3 months, or, in the case of a Class B controlled drug, a quantity sufficient to provide treatment for a period not exceeding 1 month:
- “(b) Where the medical practitioner has prescribed a quantity sufficient to provide treatment for more than 1 month, that requirement shall be dispensed in monthly lots, unless—
 - “(i) The medical practitioner endorses the prescription with the quantity to be dispensed on one or more occasions or with a statement of the period for which one or more lots is to be dispensed; or
 - “(ii) The contractor or the patient endorses the back of the prescription with a statement of the special reasons why a greater quantity is required to be dispensed:
- “(c) Notwithstanding paragraph (a) of this clause, where the medical practitioner prescribes a pharmaceutical requirement specified in the Schedule to this direction as being subject to ‘antibiotic restriction’, payment may be made for only such amount of the requirement as is sufficient to provide treatment for a period not exceeding 4 days and, where the prescription specifies a repeat, for only such further amount of the requirement as is sufficient to provide treatment for one further period not exceeding 4 days unless the prescription is endorsed ‘extended supply’, and specifies in it the quantity required or the period for which treatment is required, in which case payment may be made for the actual quantity dispensed if that quantity does not exceed

that necessary to provide treatment for a period of 3 months; but where a patient is receiving an extended supply of such a requirement, that requirement shall be dispensed in monthly lots, unless—

“(i) The medical practitioner endorses the prescription with the quantity to be dispensed on one or more occasions or with a statement of the period for which one or more lots is to be dispensed; or

“(ii) The contractor or the patient endorses the prescription with a statement of the special reasons why a greater quantity is required to be dispensed:

“(d) Any prescription that is not presented to a contractor for dispensing within 7 days of its being written in the case of a Class B controlled drug, or within 3 months of its being written in any other case, shall cease to be a charge to the Department:

“(e) A repeat on a prescription that remains unfulfilled after—

“(i) Three months from the date of first dispensing in the case of a prescription for a pharmaceutical requirement for a total supply of from 1 to 3 months; or

“(ii) One month from the date of first dispensing in any other case—

shall cease to be a charge to the Department; but the contractor concerned may submit a claim for the part fulfilment of the total quantity ordered in respect of the part that is due for payment and payment may be made accordingly.”

8. Period and quantity of supply in respect of prescriptions for oral contraceptives—Clause 26 of the Tariff shall be read as if paragraph (a) were revoked.

9. Period and quantity of supply when prescription written by dentist—Clause 27 (c) of the Tariff shall be read as if the words “endorses the prescription with the words extended supply and” were omitted.

10. Original packs and certain antibiotics—Clause 28 of the Tariff shall be read as if, for subclause (1), there were substituted the following subclause:

“(1) Notwithstanding clauses 25 and 27 of this direction, if a practitioner orders a pharmaceutical requirement that is packed in a special container from which it is not practicable to dispense lesser amounts, or in a collapsible tube, every reference in those clauses to an amount for which payment may be made shall be deemed to be a reference—

“(a) Where an amount by weight or volume of the requirement is specified in the prescription, to the smallest container of the requirement, or the smallest number of containers of the requirement, sufficient to provide that amount; and

“(b) In every other case, to the amount contained in the smallest container of the requirement that is manufactured in or imported into New Zealand.”

11. Bulk supply orders—Clause 29 (2) of the Tariff shall be read as if, after the words “controlled drug”, there were inserted the words “or for buprenorphine hydrochloride”.

12. Practitioner's supply orders—Clause 30 (2) (d) of the Tariff shall be read as if—

- (a) After the words “controlled drug”, there were inserted the words “or for buprenorphine hydrochloride”; and
- (b) After the words “Hospital Board”, there were inserted the words “or an Area Health Board”.

13. Endorsement of prescription with words “Approved condition”—The Tariff shall be read as if clause 32 were revoked.

14. Definition of “Antibiotic restriction”—Clause 2 of Part I of the Schedule to the Tariff shall be read as if, for the expression “25 (b)”, there were substituted the expression “25 (c)”.

15. Definition of “Approved condition”—Part I of the Schedule to the Tariff shall be read as if clause 3 were revoked.

16. Definition of “Diabetic syringes”—Clause 5 of Part I of the Schedule to the Tariff shall be read as if, for the expressions “13” and “1”, there were substituted, respectively, the expressions “26” and “2”.

17. Definition of “Hospital Pharmacy”—Clause 6 of Part I of the Schedule to the Tariff shall be read as if, after the words “Hospital Board”, there were inserted the words “or an Area Health Board”.

18. Definition of “Hospital Pharmacy-dermatologist”—Part I of the Schedule to the Tariff shall be read as if, for clause 7, there were substituted the following clause:

“7. ‘Hospital Pharmacy-dermatologist’ means that the pharmaceutical requirement concerned may be supplied free of charge only by a Hospital Board or an Area Health Board to a person who is not an inpatient of a public hospital, and on the prescription of a specialist in dermatology.”

19. Definition of “Hospital Pharmacy-specialist”—Clause 8 of Part I of the Schedule to the Tariff shall be read as if, after the words “Hospital Board”, there were inserted the words “or an Area Health Board”.

20. Certain pharmaceutical requirements deleted from Part II of Schedule to Tariff—Part II of the Schedule to the Tariff shall be read as if the pharmaceutical requirements specified in the First Schedule to this direction were deleted.

21. Certain pharmaceutical requirements added to Part II of Schedule to Tariff—Part II of the Schedule to the Tariff shall be read as if it included the pharmaceutical requirements specified in the Second Schedule to this direction and as if those requirements were available to the extent specified in that Schedule.

22. Revocation—The Drug Tariff 1984, Amendment No. 6* is hereby revoked.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

This note is not part of the direction, but is intended to indicate its general effect.

This direction, which comes into force on 1 August 1986, has 2 effects. First, it provides that where the dispensing of a pharmaceutical requirement attracts goods and services tax (which will not occur until 1 October 1986 when the Goods and Services Tax Act 1985 comes into force) the \$1 prescription charge will not be increased. Secondly, it provides for deletions from and additions to the list of pharmaceutical requirements in Part II of the Schedule to the Drug Tariff 1984. Deleted items do not in all cases disappear from the list, as they are sometimes added again in a varied form. Some of the items added are:
