THE EXPLOSIVE AND DANGEROUS GOODS REGULATIONS 1914, AMENDMENT NO. 19

ORDER IN COUNCIL

At the Government House at Wellington this 4th day of April 1956

Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL IN COUNCIL

PURSUANT to the Explosive and Dangerous Goods Act 1908, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, hereby makes the following regulations.

REGULATIONS

1. These regulations may be cited as the Explosive and Dangerous Goods Regulations 1914, Amendment No. 19, and shall be read together with and deemed part of the regulations relating to explosive and dangerous goods made under the Explosive and Dangerous Goods Act 1908 on the 27th day of July 1914* (hereinafter referred to as the principal regulations).

2. The principal regulations are hereby amended by inserting, after regulation 133, the following regulation:

“133A. The following explosives are hereby declared to be explosives within the meaning of subsection (3) (except paragraph (a)) and subsection (4) of section 16 of the Explosive and Dangerous Goods Act 1908, and those provisions shall apply to those explosives accordingly, namely:

EXPLANATORY NOTE

[This note is not part of the regulations, but is intended to indicate their general effect.]

The effect of these regulations is that no person may sell any of the explosives specified in regulation 2 to any person who is unknown to the seller, unless—

- (a) The sale is made in the presence of some witness who is known to the seller and to whom the purchaser is known; and
- (b) The witness and the purchaser, before delivery of the explosives to the purchaser, sign their names and addresses in the register of sales required by the principal regulations to be kept by the seller.
