ORDER IN COUNCIL

Present :

THE RIGHT HON. S. G. HOLLAND PRESIDING IN COUNCIL

PURSUANT to the Workers' Compensation Amendment Act, 1950, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, doth hereby make the following regulations.

REGULATIONS

1. (1) These regulations may be cited as the Employers' Liability Insurance Regulations 1951.

(2) These regulations shall come into force on the 1st day of April, 1951.

2. In these regulations, unless the context otherwise requires,—

“The Act” means Part I of the Workers' Compensation Amendment Act, 1950 :

“Accident” includes the contracting of any disease to which section 10 of the Workers' Compensation Act, 1922, applies :

“Board” means the Workers' Compensation Board established under the Act ; and includes any person acting on behalf of and with the express or implied authority of the Board :

“Employer” means an employer to whom the Act applies :

“Insurer”, in relation to any employer, means the authorized insurer that is for the time being his insurer under the Act, or where the Board is his insurer, means the Board ; and includes any person acting on behalf of and with the express or implied authority of his insurer :

“Wages” includes all salaries, wages, emoluments, holiday pay, and benefits of whatsoever kind received by a worker from his employer :

“Worker” means a worker with respect to whom the Act applies.

VALUE OF BENEFITS ALLOWED AS PART OF WAGES

3. Where a worker is allowed by his employer free board and lodging or the free use of a house or any other emolument or benefit of whatsoever kind not paid in cash any such allowance shall for the purposes of the Act be valued at such amount as any statutory authority governing the terms of the employment may have determined should be paid in cash in the absence of the allowance, or, in the absence of any such determination, at such amount as the insurer decides.

STATEMENT OF WAGES

4. The statement of wages to be delivered by an employer to the insurer under section 8 of the Act shall be made and furnished in the form numbered 1 in the First Schedule hereto.

RATES OF PREMIUM

5. (1) Except as otherwise herein provided, the maximum rates of premium to be charged to an employer by an insurer for indemnity under the Act shall be the several rates set out in the Second Schedule hereto according to the occupation or occupations in which the employer's workers are engaged.

(2) Except where otherwise provided in the said Schedule, the rates shown are per £100 of wages.

(3) Where the employer carries on two or more occupations subject to different premium rates in premises or buildings communicating internally with each other, the premium rate to be charged may be one general rate agreed upon between the insurer and the employer, but in no case to exceed the Schedule rate for the highest rated of the several occupations. Failing an agreement between the insurer and the employer, the rate shall be decided, on application, by the Board.

(4) Clerical workers where occupied solely in office work, or in the supervision of office work, shall be rated at the rate shown in the said Schedule for clerical workers, irrespective of the employer's occupation. The manager of any employer's business or any branch thereof who undertakes no work of any kind other than supervision may be classed as a clerical worker.

(5) Commercial travellers shall be rated at the rate shown in the said Schedule for commercial travellers irrespective of the employer's occupation.

(6) Drivers of vehicles shall be rated at the rate for the occupation in connection with which the driving is done unless there is a specific rate for that driving set out in the said Schedule :

Provided that in no case shall the rate exceed that provided for drivers of goods vehicles.

(7) The minimum premium for a year or shorter period of insurance shall be 5s.

(8) The premium in respect of a contractor who is deemed to be a worker under section 63 of the Workers' Compensation Act, 1922, shall be calculated on the following basis :—

- (a) If the contract is for labour only, or 100 per cent of the contract price :
- (b) If the contract is for labour and plant, unless otherwise decided by the insurer, on 66 $\frac{2}{3}$ per cent of the contract price.

ASSESSMENT OF PREMIUMS

6. (1) The assessment of premium (which expression shall include the new assessment or the adjusted assessment or the additional assessment, as the case may be) which the insurer shall make (or may make, as the case may be) under section 13, section 14, or section 16 of the Act shall be in the form numbered 2 in the First Schedule hereto.

(2) Pending the assessment of premium the insurer, on receipt from an employer of a statement of wages under section 8 of the Act, shall forthwith send to the employer an acknowledgment of the receipt of the statement.

CERTIFICATE OF INSURANCE

7. On payment of the premium an official cash receipt of the insurer shall be issued. The cash receipt, together with the assessment of premium, shall constitute for the purposes of subsection (3) of section 15 of the Act, and for all other purposes, a certificate of insurance for the period shown on the assessment.

NOTIFICATION OF ACCIDENTS

8. (1) The notification of accidents which the employer is required to give to the insurer under subsection (1) of section 17 of the Act shall be made and furnished in the form numbered 3 in the First Schedule hereto.

(2) The notice of accident to be given by the employer to the Inspector of Factories under subsection (2) of section 17 of the Act shall be in the form numbered 4 in the First Schedule hereto.

DELIVERY OF STATEMENTS AND NOTICES

9. All statements, notifications, or other communications whatsoever required by the Act or by these regulations to be delivered to an insurer by an employer may be delivered by post or otherwise to the Head Office or any branch office of the insurer, or to any agent or sub-agent of the Insurer.

EXEMPTIONS

10. Every certificate granted by the Secretary of Labour under section 6 of the Act exempting an employer from the obligation to insure under the Act shall be in the form numbered 5 in the First Schedule hereto.

APPEALS

11. (1) Every appeal by an employer from any decision of the Secretary of Labour under section 5 or section 6 of the Act shall be made within fourteen days after the receipt of the decision, by filing with the Registrar of the Compensation Court at Wellington or in the industrial district in which the employer has his place of business, or his principal place of business in New Zealand, a notice of appeal in the form numbered 6 in the First Schedule hereto.

(2) The employer shall also within the said period of fourteen days serve on the Secretary of Labour a copy of the notice of appeal. Service on the Secretary of Labour may be effected by delivering the notice to the Head Office of the Department of Labour and Employment in Wellington or by sending it by registered letter addressed to the Secretary of Labour.

(3) Every decision of the Secretary of Labour under section 5 or section 6 of the Act shall be deemed to be received by the employer concerned on the day when the certificate of exemption or notice of the refusal of a certificate of exemption, as the case may be, would normally be received by the employer in the ordinary course of post.

EMPLOYER'S RECORD

12. Every employer who employs any worker to whom the Workers' Compensation Act, 1922, applies shall keep a record in writing showing in respect of each worker—

- (a) His name :
- (b) His age if under twenty-one years :
- (c) The occupation in which he is employed :
- (d) The time worked by him and the dates of the employment :
- (e) The wages paid to him.

FORMS

13. Where anything is required to be in any of the forms in the First Schedule hereto it shall be sufficient if it is given in a form to the like effect, and any of those forms may be modified to suit particular cases, or to suit cases for which forms have not been prescribed.

COMMISSIONS

14. (1) No commission, or allowance of any kind in place thereof, in respect of premiums payable under the Act shall be paid by an insurer to any person who is not an agent of the insurer duly appointed in writing.

(2) An agent of any insurer duly appointed in writing shall not be paid commission in respect of premiums paid by him to the insurer for employers' liability insurance unless he is in fact an active agent securing business other than his own for the insurer.

(3) The maximum rate of commission to be paid by an insurer to an agent in respect of employers' liability insurance shall be 5 per cent of the premiums paid :

Provided that on application in writing by an insurer, setting out any special circumstances that are relevant, the Board may authorize a rate of commission not exceeding 10 per cent to a controlling agent.

REVOCATIONS AND SAVINGS

15. (1) The following regulations are hereby revoked, namely :—

- (a) The Employers' Liability Insurance Regulations 1949* :
- (b) The Employers' Liability Insurance Regulations 1949, Amendment No. 1†.

(2) All liabilities and claims, and generally all acts of authority that originated under the regulations hereby revoked, and are subsisting or in force at the commencement of these regulations shall enure for the purposes of these regulations as if they had originated under these regulations and accordingly shall, where necessary, be deemed to have so originated.

(3) All matters and proceedings commenced under the regulations hereby revoked, and pending or in progress at the commencement of these regulations, may be continued and completed under these regulations.

EMPLOYERS' LIABILITY INSURANCE

*Under the Workers' Compensation Act, 1922*1. *Commencement Date.*—1st April,

2. *Scope of Insurance.*—The Act provides for the employer to be indemnified against his liabilities for accidents to "workers" arising under the Workers' Compensation Act, 1922, the Deaths by Accident Compensation Act, 1908, the Coal Mines Act, 1925, the Mining Act, 1926, Parts I, II, V, and VI of the Law Reform Act, 1936, or by virtue of the common law.

3. *Compulsory Insurance.*—An employer who employs a "worker" (for definition see paragraph 4 below) in any occupation, whether or not the employment is in or for the purposes of any trade or business carried on by the employer, and whether or not the employment is of a casual nature is required to insure. (N.B.—A "member of family" is not a "worker"—see paragraph 5 below.) Contractors and share farmers are required to insure their employees.

4. *Definition of "Worker"*—"Worker" includes any of the following (but not a "member of family"—see paragraph 5 below):—

- (a) Any person who has entered into or works under a contract of service or apprenticeship with an employer, whether by way of manual labour, clerical work, or otherwise, and whether remunerated by wages, salary, or otherwise; or
- (b) Share farmer—*i.e.*, a person who in consideration of a share in returns or profits is engaged in any class of farming operations otherwise than under a contract of service; or
- (c) Driver of vehicle plying for hire who shares in the earnings; or
- (d) Manual working contractors engaged in any of the following: gold mining; coal mining; cutting standing timber; scrub cutting; clearing land of stumps or logs; or
- (e) Industrial life assurance agents.

NOTE.—*Share farmers and manual working contractors mentioned in (b) and (d) must be included in your Statement of Wages, but they must themselves insure any workers that they employ.*

5. *Members of Family.*—A member of an employer's family is not a "worker" within the meaning of the Workers' Compensation Act, 1922, and is therefore not entitled as of right to the benefits provided by that Act. Therefore an employer is not compelled to insure in respect of any members of his family who may be employed by him. However, if the employer wishes he may insure members of his family voluntarily (see paragraph 6 below).

"Members of family" include the following relations of the employer: wife (or husband), parents (including step parents), grandparents, children (including illegitimate children and step children), grandchildren, brothers and sisters (including half-brothers and sisters), guardian, ward,

6. *Voluntary insurance of "Non-workers"*—An employer may insure "non-workers" employed by him who fall within any of the following classes:—

- (a) "Members of family";
- (b) Other persons who are not "workers" or who are doubtful "workers";
- (c) Persons from whom the employer is receiving the benefit of services free of charge;
- (d) Persons from whom the employer is receiving the benefit of services at less than the normal remuneration whom the employer desires to insure at a normal remuneration.

To obtain such an insurance the employer must state the name of the person to be insured (or, in the case of a person other than a "member of family," state a sufficient description of such person) and an estimated rate or remuneration.

If the person will be paid at a normal rate, the employer must state the weekly wage and keep (and other allowances if any) which will be paid; if the person will be paid at less than the normal rate and it is desired to insure him at a normal rate, the employer must state the normal rate; if no payment will be made at all, the employer must state a rate which is reasonable, having full regard to the services to be rendered and any other circumstances.

Insured "members of family" are insured to the extent of the benefits of the Workers' Compensation Act only. Other persons are insured to the full extent of the insurance attaching to ordinary "workers."

7. *Procedure.*—(1) Every person, except those who have been exempted by the Secretary of Labour, who is an employer on 1st April is required to forward an Employer's Statement of Wages to an Authorized Insurer not later than 30th April. A person who is not an employer on 1st April but who afterwards becomes an employer is required to forward an Employer's Statement of Wages within fourteen days.

(2) As soon as possible after the receipt of the Statement of Wages the Insurer will forward to the employer an Assessment of Premium.

(3) The employer is required to pay the premium within one month after the date of the assessment. If he fails to do so he is liable to a penalty of an additional 5 per cent.

(4) On payment of the premium the insurer will issue to the employer a Cash Receipt. The Assessment of Premium and Cash Receipt together constitute a certificate of insurance. No policy will be issued.

(5) If the happening of any event or the existence of any circumstances renders the employment of any workers more hazardous than it was at the time the employer completed the Statement of Wages, or if the employer commences to employ workers whom he had not provided for in the Statement of Wages, he must forthwith inform his Insurance Office.

(6) The insurance expires on the following 31st March, and the employer is then required to send in a further Statement of Wages not later than 30th April. The premium assessment made as at the preceding 1st April will then be adjusted in accordance with the actual expenditure of wages.

8. *Notification of Accidents.*—The employer is required to notify his insurance office forthwith of any accident to a worker, to furnish a report of accident on the prescribed form, and to forward a medical certificate. The employer is also required to notify each accident to the Department of Labour and Employment.
