PURSUANT to the Workers' Compensation Act 1956, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, hereby makes the following regulations.

---

**REGULATIONS**

1. (1) These regulations may be cited as the Employers' Liability Insurance Regulations 1957, Amendment No. 1, and shall be read together with and deemed part of the Employers' Liability Insurance Regulations 1957\* (hereinafter referred to as the principal regulations).

(2) These regulations shall come into force on the 1st day of April 1958.

2. Regulation 5 of the principal regulations is hereby amended by inserting, after subclause (1), the following subclause:

“(1A) Every premium assessed in respect of any period commencing on or after the 1st day of April 1958 (whether it is assessed at the maximum rate or at any lower rate) shall be subject to a rebate of 5 per cent, or to such greater rebate as the insurer thinks fit. Where the assessment shows a credit for any premium previously assessed this subclause shall apply only to the amount of premium due under the assessment.”

3. The principal regulations are hereby amended by revoking the Second Schedule, and substituting the Second Schedule set out in the Schedule to these regulations.

## EXPLANATORY NOTE

*This note is not part of the regulations, but is intended to indicate their general effect.*

These regulations provide a new schedule of rates of employers' liability insurance premiums for that contained in the Second Schedule to the Employers' Liability Insurance Regulations 1957 and have the effect of incorporating several amendments to the prescribed rates as well as a few changes in occupational descriptions. A rebate of 5 per cent is also provided for, on all premiums assessed in respect of periods commencing on or after 1 April 1958, whether they are assessed at the maximum rate or at any lower rate. Where an assessment shows a credit for any premium previously assessed, this rebate is to be allowed only off the amount of premium due under the assessment.
