THE RIGHT HON. W. NASH, C.H., PRESIDING IN COUNCIL

PURSUANT to the Workers' Compensation Act 1956, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, hereby makes the following regulations.

REGULATIONS

1. (1) These regulations may be cited as the Employers' Liability Insurance Regulations 1957, Amendment No. 3, and shall be read together with and deemed part of the Employers' Liability Insurance Regulations 1957* (hereinafter referred to as the principal regulations).

(2) These regulations shall come into force on the 1st day of April 1960.

2. Form 1 in the First Schedule to the principal regulations is hereby amended by omitting from subparagraph (1) of paragraph (b) of clause 3 the expression "£489", and substituting the expression "£515".

3. (1) The principal regulations are hereby amended by revoking the Second Schedule, as substituted by regulation 3 of the Employers' Liability Insurance Regulations 1957, Amendment No. 2, and substituting the Second Schedule set out in the Schedule to these regulations.

(2) The Employers' Liability Insurance Regulations 1957, Amendment No. 2, are hereby revoked.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

This note is not part of the regulations, but is intended to indicate their general effect.

These regulations substitute a new schedule of rates of employers' liability insurance premiums. In general the new rates incorporate an increase of approximately 20 per cent in the existing prescribed rates. The regulations also make a minor amendment to the Employer's Statement of Wages form.

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These regulations are administered in the Department of Labour.
