



**THE FIRST AID (Factories) REGULATIONS 1966,
AMENDMENT NO. 3**

ORDER IN COUNCIL

At the Government House at Wellington this 21st day of December 1981

Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL IN COUNCIL

PURSUANT to the Factories and Commercial Premises Act 1981, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, hereby makes the following regulations.

REGULATIONS

1. Title and commencement—(1) These regulations may be cited as the First Aid (Factories) Regulations 1966, Amendment No. 3, and shall be read together with and deemed part of the First Aid (Factories) Regulations 1966* (hereinafter referred to as the principal regulations).

(2) These regulations shall come into force on the 1st day of February 1982.

2. Offences—The principal regulations are hereby amended by inserting, after regulation 17, the following regulation:

“17A. Every person commits an offence against these regulations, and shall be liable on summary conviction to the penalties provided in that behalf in section 62 (1) (b) of the Factories and Commercial Premises Act 1981, who acts in contravention of, or fails or refuses duly and faithfully to comply with, any requirement, obligation, rule, or provision, imposed or enacted, or required to be observed, under these regulations.”

EXPLANATORY NOTE
