

THE FRESHWATER FISHERIES REGULATIONS (NORTH CANTERBURY) MODIFICATION NOTICE 1977

Pursuant to the Fisheries Act 1908 and the Freshwater Fisheries Regulations 1951, the Minister of Fisheries hereby gives the following notice.

NOTICE

- 1. Title—This notice may be cited as the Freshwater Fisheries Regulations (North Canterbury) Modification Notice 1977.
- **2. Commencement**—This notice shall come into force on the 1st day of October 1977.
- **3. Application**—This notice shall be in force only within the North Canterbury Acclimatisation District.
- 4. "High country waters" defined—In this notice the term "high country waters" means Lakes Lilian, Coleridge, Selfe, Evelyn, Grace, Henrietta, Ida, Little Ida, Catherine (also known as Monk), Georgina, Spectacles, Red Lakes, Lyndon Tarn, Lyndon, Rubicon, Pearson, Grasmere, Sarah, Hawdon, Marymere, Vagabonds Inn Tarn, Blackwater, Letitia, Minchin, Sheppard, Taylor, Katrine, Sumner, Mason, Guyon, and Tennyson, and all waters flowing into those lakes; and includes all other lakes and tarns lying west of a line joining—
 - (a) The white posts at the Lake Coleridge powerhouse on the Rakaia River; and

 - (b) The white posts at Woodstock on the Waimakariri River; and (c) The junction of the Hurunui River with the South Branch; and (d) The junction of the Waiau and Hope Rivers; and (e) The New Zealand Electricity Department's bridge over the Clarence River approximately 2.5 km downstream from Lake
- 5. Modification of regulations—The Freshwater Fisheries Regulations 1951* are hereby modified as follows:

Limit Bag

(a) No person shall on any one day take or kill more than 14 acclimatised fish (being trout or salmon), of which—

(i) Not more than 10 may be quinnat salmon or trout taken

from Lake Coleridge:

(ii) Not more than 4 may be quinnat salmon and not more than 10 may be trout taken from other waters:

Size Limit

(b) No person shall take or kill in any manner whatever or intentionally have in his possession any acclimatised fish (being trout or salmon) that does not exceed 25cm in length:

Restrictions on Lures and Methods

(c) No person in fishing for acclimatised fish shall—

(i) Use any natural lure or bait in any high country waters except Lakes Coleridge, Georgina, Lyndon, Pearson, Taylor, Katrine, and Sumner:

(ii) Fish from any mechanically propelled boat in any lakes except in Lakes Ellesmere, Forsyth, Coleridge, and Sumner at a distance of at least 200m from any person fishing from the shore:

(iii) Fish from any non-mechanically propelled boat in any high country waters except Lakes Coleridge, Georgina, Lyndon, Pearson, Taylor, Katrine. and Sumner:

Open Season Exceptions

(d) No person shall fish-

- (i) At any time for acclimatised fish in Taylor's Drain from its source to its junction with the Wairarapa Stream, or in the Avon River from the Armagh Street bridge at Hagley Park to the Barbadoes Street bridge:
- (ii) During the period commencing on the 1st day of October in any year and ending with the Friday immediately preceding the first Saturday in November in that year for acclimatised fish in any high country waters:
- (iii) During the months of March and April for acclimatised fish in the Rakaia River and its tributaries above the Lake Coleridge powerhouse, that point being more particularly shown by white posts on the river banks:

Provided that this subparagraph shall not apply to any lakes draining into the Rakaia River above the point specified:

- (iv) During the months of March and April for quinnat salmon in—
 - (1) The Clarence River above the New Zealand Electricity
 Department's bridge approximately 2.5 km below
 Lake Tennyson, or any tributary of that part of that
 river:
 - (2) The Hurunui River above the junction of the South Branch with that river, or any tributary of that part or that river, including Lake Sumner:

- (3) The Waiau River above the junction of that river with the Hope River, or any tributary of that part of the Waiau River:
- (4) The Waimakariri River above the white posts at Woodstock, or any tributary of that part of that river:
- (5) The Kaiapoi and Cam Rivers, or any tributary of those rivers:

Open Season Extensions

- (e) There shall be an open season for acclimatised fish from the Saturday after Queen's Birthday Weekend to the 31st day of August in the same year (both dates inclusive) in the following waters:
 - (i) The Waiau River downstream from its junction with the Hope River:
 - (ii) The Hurunui River downstream from its junction with
 - the South Branch:
 (iii) The Ashley River downstream from the Ashley Gorge
 - Road bridge approximately 0.5 km below the Domain:
 (iv) The Waimakariri River downstream from the white
 - posts at Woodstock:
 (v) The Selwyn River downstream from where the South
 - Springston Road meets that river:

 (vi) Lake Forsyth, and the Wairewa and Okuti Rivers downstream from the road bridge over each river on the Little
 - River Te Oka Bay road:

 (vii) Lakes Taylor, Sumner, Coleridge, Lyndon, and Selfe

except within 200 m of any stream flowing into those lakes:

Close Season Exceptions

(f) There shall be no close season in the Heathcote River, nor in the Avon River except as provided in paragraph (d) (i) of this clause:

Faunistic Reserve

- (g) Lake Marion and tributaries of Lake Marion are hereby declared to continue as a faunistic reserve, and the special provisions of regulation 98 of the Freshwater Fisheries Regulations 1951 shall continue to apply to those waters accordingly.
- **6. Revocations**—The Freshwater Fisheries Regulations (North Canterbury) Modification Notice 1975*, and the Freshwater Fisheries Regulations (North Canterbury) Modification Notice 1975, Amendment No. 1†, are hereby revoked.

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EXPLANATORY NOTE

This note is not part of the notice, but is intended to indicate its general effect.

Except as varied by Modification Notices of local application, the Freshwater Fisheries Regulations 1951 provide, inter alia, that—

- (a) The *limit bag*, which is the maximum number of trout or salmon that may be taken by 1 person in 1 day computed from midnight to midnight shall be 50:
- (b) The size limit, which is the minimum size of trout or salmon that may lawfully be taken, measured from tip of nose to tip of tail, shall be 15 cm. Undersized fish must be released unharmed and are not reckoned in the limit bag:
- (c) Only artificial or natural fly, insect, worm, crustacea, or fish are lawful lures or baits for acclimatised fish. Shellfish (mollusca) and fish roe are illegal. Not more than 2 lures or baits may be used. Artificial flies, which include feathered lures, must have only 1 hook. In waters restricted to fly no weight or loaded lure is permitted. Any weight must be fixed above any lure or bait and, with artificial minnow (which includes spoon), at least 38 cm above:
- (d) The duration of the open season for acclimatised fish is from 1 October to 30 April.

This notice modifies the provisions of the general regulations in the North Canterbury Acclimatisation District by limiting the number of salmon or trout that may be taken, increasing the size limit, restricting the methods of fishing that may be used in certain waters, restricting the operation of the open season in certain waters, and extending the open season in other waters. The Heathcote River and most of the Avon River are opened to year round fishing with no close season.

The notice also declares that Lake Marion and its tributaries are to continue to be a faunistic reserve where the provisions of regulation 98 of the Freshwater Fisheries Regulations 1951 (which prohibit all fishing) apply.
