

THE FRESHWATER FISHERIES REGULATIONS (OTAGO) MODIFICATION NOTICE 1958

PURSUANT to the Fisheries Act 1908 and the Freshwater Fisheries Regulations 1951, the Minister of Marine hereby gives the following notice.

NOTICE

1. This notice may be cited as the Freshwater Fisheries Regulations (Otago) Modification Notice 1958.

2. This notice shall come into force on the day after the date of

its notification in the Gazette.

- 3. This notice shall be in force only within the Otago Acclimatisation District.
- 4. The Freshwater Fisheries Regulations 1951* are hereby modified as follows:

Limit Bag

- (a) No person shall on any one day take or kill more than twenty acclimatised fish, of which—
 - (i) All may be trout taken from the Teviot River:
 - (ii) Not more than ten may be trout taken from any water other than the Teviot River:

Size Limit

- (b) No person shall take or kill in any manner whatever or intentionally have in his possession any acclimatised fish that does not exceed—
 - (i) In the case of any trout or salmon taken from the Kahiku Stream, the Teviot River, the Water of Leith, the Waitati Stream, or the Evansdale Stream, or from the tributaries of those streams, 9 in. in length:
 - (ii) In the case of any trout or salmon taken from the Mataura River or from the Tomahawk Lagoons, 12 in. in length:
 - (iii) In the case of any trout or salmon taken from any water other than those described in subparagraphs (i) and (ii) hereof, 10 in. in length:

Restrictions on Lures and Methods

(c) No person in fishing for acclimatised fish shall-

(i) With any natural bait, other than natural minnow, use any multiple hook or more than two single hooks:

(ii) Use more than one artificial minnow:

- (iii) When trolling, use any artificial minnow having attached thereto any Stewart tackle or use more than one single and two multiple hooks:
 - (iv) Troll from any mechanically propelled or towed boat:
- (v) In the Mahinerangi Dam during the period from one hour after sunset to one hour before sunrise, use any natural bait:

Indigenous Fish

(d) No person in fishing for eels shall use any hook smaller than size 4/0 (old numbers) or any hook attached by gut or nylon to a line, unless he is fishing in any river within one mile of the sea by water from low-tide mark:

Open Sea Exceptions

(e) No person shall fish for any acclimatised fish—

- (i) In the waters of the Mataura River between a straight line drawn across the river from a point on the east bank in line with the northern boundary of Eden Street in the Borough of Mataura, and a straight line drawn across the river from a point on the east bank in line with the northern boundary of Doctors Road in the borough, the limits of those waters being more specifically shown by the sites of white posts marked "Prohibited Fishing Limit" erected on the banks of the river at the terminal points of the lines hereinbefore described:
- (ii) Fish between the Roxburgh Dam and a line joining the sites of posts marked "Fishing prohibited above this point", placed on either side of the Clutha River at the outlet of the spillway from the Roxburgh powerhouse.
- 5. The Freshwater Fisheries Regulations (Otago) Modification Notice 1956* is hereby revoked.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

This note is not part of the notice, but is intended to indicate its general effect. Except as varied by modification notices of local application, the Freshwater Fisheries Regulations 1951 provide, inter alia, that-

(a) The *limit bag*, which is the maximum number of acclimatised fish that may be taken by one person in one day computed from midnight to midnight, shall be twenty:

(b) The size limit, which is the minimum size of fish that may lawfully be taken, measured from tip of nose to tip of tail, shall be 9 in. for trout and salmon. Undersized fish must be released unharmed and are not reckoned in the limit bag:

(c) Only artificial or natural fly, insect, worm, crustacea, or fish are lawful lures or baits for acclimatised fish. Shellfish (mollusca) and fish roe are illegal. Not more than two lures or baits may be used. Artificial flies, which include feathered lures, must have only one hook. In waters restricted to fly, no weight or loaded lure is permitted. Any weight must be affixed above any lure or bait and, with artificial minnow (which includes spoon), at least 15 in. above:

(d) The duration of the open season for acclimatised fish is from 1 October

to 30 April.

This notice modifies the provisions of the general regulations in the Otago Acclimatisation District by limiting to ten the number of trout that may be taken in any waters except the Teviot River, amending the size limit in certain waters, imposing restrictions on lures and methods that may be used in certain waters, and restricting the operation of the open season in a specified part of the Mataura River.
